<u>Reminders</u>

We are sorry when paint gets on your child's clothing. We put paint shirts on the children, but sometimes they are not enough to prevent accidents. We get paint on ourselves also, and we have found that Spray and Wash or Murphys' Oil Soap are products that if placed directly on the spot will remove it. Check each day for paint spots.

Please put your child's name in jackets, coats, sweaters, hats, book bags, boots, etc. It is often hard for children to remember which item is theirs, especially if it is new. By the end of each school year we always have quite an assortment of perfectly good clothing articles and we have no idea of who they belong to.

It is a state licensing rule that the Extended Care children have a period of outdoor play each day when the weather is not too severe. Please remember to send warm outdoor clothing with your child as the weather begins to turn cooler.

If your child is absent, we will need a note explaining the reason for the absence on the date of his or her return.

Please remember to keep to the right in a single line when dropping off or picking up




Please remember that the drive next to and behind the church is one way. Be sure to enter on Seaman next to the church and exit on Seaman next to the Lutheran Home.



I wanted to extend my extra special thanks to the parents who accompanied us on our field trip to the planetarium! Afterwards, our host told me that out of all the pre-k classes that he`s had ours was the best behaved. He also was impressed with the questions that the children had for him after the show!

October promises to be just as exciting as September. We will begin the month with a theme on Fairy Tales. Dramatic play will be set up with a castle which will allow the children to act out their favorite fairy tales. At the math/science table the children will play a magic wand shape game, Jack's bean counting match-up, and will also grow beans and chart their progress. At the writing table we will create our own fairy tales and will also play a crown alphabet matching game. The reading center will focus on fairy tale literature, books on real castles, and will including a puppet theater and puppets. At the sensory table the children will practice making patterns by stringing fruit loops by following pattern cards. Some art projects will include magic wands, crowns and ladies hats, beanstalk pictures, and dragons.

On Wednesday, October 15th we will be traveling to Erie Orchard. I hope the weather is a little warmer than last years October field trip! It was very chilly!!! More info to follow in a separate letter! I can`t wait to go!

After our fairy tale theme is concluded, we will transition into Halloween. Knowing that Halloween can be scary for some children we will have many discussions during circle time about costumes, what is real and what is pretend, along with trick-or-treat safety. We will also sing songs, try to guess Halloween riddles, and listen to the spooky walk! Our dramatic play area will be set up with the castle for trick-or-treating along with costumes, and other holiday props. We will explore the colors orange and black at the sensory table. At the math/science center, we will investigate the insides of a pumpkin, play a spider leg counting game, and play a pumpkin matching game. The writing center will also be a fun place to visit. The children will draw faces on pumpkins along with exploring the letter Pp. At the art center projects include masks, candy corn star prints, tissue paper pumpkins, and spectacular spider webs. We will be cooking on October 22nd. We will be making yummy pumpkins!

Our Halloween party is on Thursday, October 30th so that the children can have Friday to help rest up for trick-or-treat. I hope you can come and join us!

Miss Heather's TR Class News

I have to say God has truly blessed me with your children. I look at them as seeds God has planted in my life that I will be able to nurture and guide in their growth and development and in their walk of faith as Gods precious seeds. Their personalities have truly touched my heart and I am looking forward to the many moments spent with them!

We will be start October out with a Fall Harvest theme where we will look at how the earth is changing during this season of autumn. We will be taking nature walks and collecting leafs that we will use for a fall collage. We will talk about how a seed can change into many things like apples and pumpkins for instance.

We will be focusing on the letter "A" and playing fun learning games and making crafts that pertain to the letter recognition and the sound it makes. We will use an apple for a part of this by painting with the apples. We will graph apples and study the different colors, sizes, and tastes. We will also graph our taste test of apples to see who likes what color best. We will add other fall produce to our art projects, sensory table, and science table such as potatoes, corn, gourds, etc. On Tuesday the 14th and 21st, we will be making apple bread and applesauce.

Towards the end of October we will study a pumpkin and learn about it from the outside in. We will cut into the pumpkin and learn about its smell, texture, color and taste. We will place some seeds at the science table for children to explore. We will bake the seeds and have a taste test.

We have a field trip planned for Tuesday, October 14th to visit Erie Orchard and Cider Mill in Michigan. Permission slips will come home soon. Please make sure you check the weather and dress your child appropriately, make sure to put them in play clothes it may be muddy.

Miss Ashley`s Class News

"Be thankful in all circumstances, for this is God`s will for you who belong to Christ Jesus." 1 Thessalonians 5:18

At the end of September, we began learning about apples. We will continue this theme through the beginning of October. Our dramatic play area as been transformed into an apple orchard! The children are able to "buy and sell" apples, apple cider, and baked goods to one another. At the end of this theme, we will be visiting Erie Orchards where the children can observe what takes place at a real apple orchard.

In our science center, children will be able to compare apple seeds with other types of seeds, as well as study the growth and life cycle of an appleseed, weigh apples, and experiment with the effects of salt, air, and lemon juice on the appearance of apples. In the math center, students will be able to sort apples by size and color, participate in a taste-testing to graph our favorite kinds of apples, and practice counting through various activities.

At the art center, we will be making Johnny Appleseed hats, making apple prints, and making yummy treats with apples. We will also be doing apple patterning activities and making mosaic apples.

We have begun focusing on one letter a week, starting with the letter A and working our way through the alphabet. At carpet, we are completing a classroom ABC book that includes students and pictures of other items with the corresponding letter. At the writing center, students can practice writing the letter of the week independently and with the assistance of teachers. Art activities, such as gluing buttons and beans on the letter B and painting green on the letter G, will also correspond with the letter of the week.

Towards the middle of the month, we will transition into a fall/harvest theme. Our dramatic play area will become a farmer's market with pumpkins, gourds, leaves, and scarecrows. The science table will focus on comparing different types of corn and corn products, as well as the life cycle of a pumpkin and the comparison of different kinds of leaves. At the math center, we will make cornmeal playdough and practice sorting shapes. We will also be making many fun art projects, such as scarecrows, spiderwebs, and pumpkins.

With Halloween quickly approaching, we will be asking for volunteers to bring in goodies for the children and to help with the party. We will be sending home more information closer to the date.

Miss Bonnie's Class News

...love one another. Romans 13:8 WOW! September is over and summer is gone. Fall is here and it's time to get busy. I think the children are snuggled in and have made a lot of new friends. I`m enjoying getting to know them. They are all so sweet and eager to learn. To your little one, learning new things is child`s play. This week we`ll be using the farm theme to learn a variety of lively learning. Including beginning sounds, counting, color, shapes, and classifying. In dramatic play there will be a barn and barnyard with tractors and farm animals. The children will enjoy imitating the noises and be-havior of different farm animals. There will also be a fruit and vegetable stand where the chil-dren can sell what they harvested. At carpet we'll be having discussions about why farms are important to people. What do

farmers produce? How do farms work? How do farmers keep animals from wondering away? How do farmers gather fruits and vegetables when they are ready to be harvested? We'll have some fun by playing games like piglets in the puddle (counting to ten) along with other musical games.

The writing center will have shaving cream covered tables. The children will be able to practice writing in the shaving cream or spread it over a lamb to resemble its woolly coat.

To develop their fine motor skills the children will be removing kernels from ears or corn then encouraged to find the hidden calves in the corn. At the Math and Science center the children will be playing a dice game to distinguish more, less, and comparing Bossie and Flossie's spots. To help learn that some baby animals have different names from their parents, there will be a matching card game. The children will also be charting nutty predictions. For art we`ll be making animals such as cows, pigs and ducks all out of paper plates, sun

flowers, ears of corn and the letter B.

The children will be tasting many different types of cheese, fruits and vegetables to help remind them that some food come from plants that farmers grow, and other food comes from animals.

Last but not least we will be taking a field trip to the Country Lane Tree Farm. It`s a fabulous farm for kids of all ages. The children will participate in milking a cow and feeding animals.

Miss Heather's MWF Class News

It is now officially fall, my favorite time of the year. In October we will be "Down on the Farm" and discussing apples and the apple orchard. This month we will also be discussing God's wonderful creations and introducing the first few letters of the alphabet.

Our dramatic play area will be transformed into a farm complete with a barn, John Deer tractor, stick horses and farmer dress-up clothes. In math center we will sort farm animals from other animals and place them in a barn, match animals to their legs, and graph our favorite apples. In science we will pretend to milk a cow, make butter, look at different types of soil, create crazy snacks, and taste test apples. At writing center we will begin introducing some letters of the alphabet and objects/words that begin with those letters and continue writing letters to our family and friends. Some art projects include: making tractor tracks, painting with farm animal shapes, texture pigs, sponge painting cows, some fun Halloween projects, and many more.

We have a field trip planned to visit Erie Orchard and Cider Mill in Michigan. If you have never been there you are in for a treat, if you have been there I am sure you are looking forward to it, this is a wonderful trip! We will be combining A.M and P.M that day. Permission slips will come soon. Please make sure you check the weather and dress your child appropriately, make sure to put them in play clothes it may be muddy. There is also Halloween Party information attached to this newsletter! This is going to be a wonderful month at First St. John!

Kindergarten Highlights

We are off to a great start! We have an amazing class this year and are excited about the wonderful things they are learning and bringing to the classroom. We have much planned for the month of October. I hope we can fit it all in!

Language Arts and Literacy - By now most of our children are able to recognize their first name. We continue to work on writing first names. My goal this month is that they will all know and recognize their first and last names (I am not expecting them to write their last name yet). Also, we will continue to identify all uppercase and lowercase letters and associate them with the sounds that they represent (with the exception of vowels). We continue to work on concepts of print, namely, reading books from front to back and words from left to right as well as with writing applications, namely, dictating and simple journal entries, writing left to right, and top to bottom. We continue to work on learning to write all capital letters. When we get through all capitals we will move on to lower case letters.

If your child is ready we may begin to send home the first of the sight word lists for your child to start memorizing. Sight words are simple words that children recognize by sight. These are not words that should be sounded out or decoded (and some can`t be). These words should be memorized so that your child can read them in a flash. This will empower your children to start reading and writing as well as promote fluency. More details will come home with your child when I send home his first list of words,

<u>Math</u> - Most children are able to recognize 1-10 and count to 10. If your child is not able to recognize 1-10 we will continue to give them support. My goal is to start working more with the teens this month (11-20). We are still working on writing numerals 1-10. We will also continue to review basic 2 dimensional shapes and begin to compare them to solid shapes. In September we started working with measuring using non standard units. We will extend this and add some standard units of measurement and explore standard measuring tools such as rulers, scales and measuring tape. Recognizing and making patterns will continue to be incorporated into daily activities as well.

<u>Science</u> - We have wrapped up our unit on bees. By now, your children should be able to give you some fascinating information about these insects. Our butterfly unit did not go as well as planned as I was not able to find the Monarch eggs that I was looking for. We did learn about the structure of a butterfly (Main parts), its life cycle, and how they adapt to the changing climate in Ohio. But we were unable to observe the structure and changes that the butterfly goes through. We will revisit this unit in the spring and hopefully be able to find a butterfly to observe. I thank all the children and parents who tried to help me enhance this unit with caterpillars and milkweed and amazing science projects from home.

Our tree and forest animal unit is in full swing. We also added Apple Activities as an extension to the tree unit and were able to do some fun activities with apples. This month we will of course observe the changes of the season and take notice the signs of autumn. We will also learn a little about farm animals and compare them to the types of animals we learned about in September. We will also experiment with pumpkins and investigate spiders, bats and the human skeleton as extensions to our October literature. As the days get shorter we have a perfect opportunity to start learning about the night and night activity as well. October is always a very busy <u>Social Studies</u> - We continue to get acquainted with one another and get used to what it is like to be in Kindergarten. We will explore a little bit of the economic aspect of running a farm, as an extension of course we will visit Country Lane Tree Farm, where we learn so much about the different aspects of farm life. This month and early November we will also talk about safety.

Of course, we have a big holiday at the end of the month so we will discuss the origins of Halloween and discuss real vs. make believe. Many children attend Halloween parties and go Trick or Treating. This is a great time to talk about using good manners (a topic which we will extend into in November)

<u>**Religion</u>** - Throughout the year we will continually focus on acting and living as Jesus taught us. The theme of the Gospel and the repeated message throughout is to love. We will continue to reinforce this message in our classroom through Gospel stories, songs and example. Halloween can be a frightening time for some children. We can help young children take comfort in God's love through psalms, stories and Bible passages that remind us that He is with us always.</u>

<u>The Water Bottle Dilemma</u> - We have noticed that lately most of the children are not drinking the water that they bring in their water bottles. In fact many are not even bothering to take them out of their backpacks. This may be because they are not as thirsty with the cooler weather. Also, most prefer the water we serve at school because "it tastes colder". Moreover, we are experiencing angst among some of our more particular students because their papers and folders are getting "all yucky" due to water bottle related hazards. With this in mind we have decided to ask parents to stop sending in the water bottles at this time. We will keep cool water on hand throughout the day so that we may keep everyone hydrated and hopefully happy. Thank you for your patience and understanding in this matter.

<u>KRAL</u> - A few parents have asked me about the results of the Kindergarten Literacy Assessments conducted in August. This assessment was primarily for me to evaluate the needs of your children and adjust the curriculum accordingly. If anyone would like to discuss the results of your child's assessment let me know and I will be happy to meet with you.

Well I believe I have given everyone enough to read for now. If you have any questions about anything as always, please call or drop me a note. Have a beautiful month!




