n Sunday, September 11, we and the rest of the country and world will acknowledge the 10^{th} anniversary of the events of September 11, 2001. Our emotions and memories will be everywhere. But I came across a piece written by Gregory Tolle concerning another terrorist attack—this one in Oklahoma City, on April 19^{th} , 1995. Greg Tolle's story is meant for us:

At 9:02 p.m., July 4th, 2001, I sat at the property of Fifth and Harvey in downtown Oklahoma City. Six years, two months, fifteen days and twelve hours earlier, the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building had stood there. Now following the tragic bombing, it is the Oklahoma City National Memorial.

I was at the site for a United Methodist youth worship service. Six hundred and twenty people had gathered with our group at his unique setting at this unique time to worship God. I sat in the shadow of dusk six feet away from The Reflecting Pool – a shallow pool of gently cascading water. And that's what I did. I reflected. I sat there with memories of the bombing bombarding me.

As I sat at the memorial for the youth worship service, I continued to reflect on every connection I had with the bombing. Mental images of the television flashed in my mind. I once again saw bloody people frantically scurrying around. I saw the picture of the fireman carrying the body of Baylee Almon. I remembered driving by the rubble where the building had stood a little over a month before the destruction.

The group of 620 worshippers began to sing "Shout To The Lord." Somewhere after the words, "My Jesus, my Savior," I started to quietly release the emotions associated with the sense of life. My eyes welled up with sadness expressed with tears. At the same time, I found comfort in singing what I believe – salvation is available through Jesus. In Christ, there is hope, even in the midst of a tragedy.

As we concluded the service, the Independence Day fireworks began. Some of the youth were disturbed by it. It was frightening to have "bombs bursting in air" at a place where a bomb had been so destructive. But I looked at it differently. I sat and stared at the beautiful colors. Red. Orange. Sparkling white. They shot up so quickly and cascaded down so gently. Grace. It was grace falling down over us as a reminder of freedom. We have the freedom of free will. Some will choose evil, but when the vilest of evil springs forth, others accept the challenge to prove that good conquers evil. We have the free will to choose the good.

As I sat at the Memorial, I saw the good that replaced the evil. I witnessed a living testament of Paul's words in Romans 12:21: Do not be overcome with evil, but overcome evil with good.

The Oklahoma City National Memorial is a reminder not just of what has happened, but also of what can be. No longer was the area of Fifth and Harvey a pile of rubble – a mound of destroyed dreams. No, this is now a new place of new life. It represents how we can respond to the reality of evil with the much needed reality of good. On that Fourth of July, 2001, I saw that good not only in the Memorial. I saw a sign of God's grace gently cascading on earthly people who needed it. That is the Good News. We can overcome evil with God's good Grace.

News from The Church Mouse

The hazy, lazy days of a record-breaking summer have passed us by. It's time to rise to the challenges of the Fall Harvest Festival and the beginning of a new church year. The Mouse will be looking for you on Rally Day on September 11th. Will you see me?

The annual Harvest Festival will be observed on September 18th. Unlike today, the early St. John congregation was part of a mostly agricultural society. Fruits and grains from the harvest were displayed at this service in thankfulness for a bountiful harvest. The following week all the donations were home-canned and stored for the coming winter's food supply at the Orphan's Home. Today, pure food laws would prohibit these gifts.

Within our 150th celebration year we also celebrate the "new" Educational Building's 50th anniversary. On January 10, 1961, the Finance Committee announced that, "\$141,528.14 has been received from pledges thus far. The total cost of the building was \$285,000.00." Our 150-year financial record has been one of hard times, but we are blessed with a well kept Church campus. We pray that our spirituality record will be judged in the same light.

Spiritually, our early years were times of limited transportation and long hours of labor. The Pastor / Teacher / Schoolhouse relationship was instituted in the first years, but other activities did not come until the early 1900s when automobiles first appeared.

Times rapidly began to change. Horse and hand labor gave way to new mechanical "machines." The Lady of the House went from a "wash board" to the washing machine, and wheat harvesting gave way to the threshing machine. Rather than taking the horse and buggy to town, a farmer would take his Machine to town. This Mouse was a teenager before the words Automobile or Car became common usage.

Our public and religious educational systems also have sustained changes. Today we frown upon the memorization of the Catechism or multiplication tables. If we are lucky enough to get old, memories of memorization will be all we have left. Our ability for free or analytical thinking slowly disappears.

Why not have a favorite Bible passage or the Catechism to comfort us in our golden years?

This Mouse also would remind you of the old saying, "If you see a mouse, there is sure to be another close by." If you remember the addition and multiplication tables, one mouse and one mouse equals not two mice, but a family subject to additions. We Mice think of it as multiplications!

CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES - AUGUST 9, 2011

Bill Caldwell called the meeting to order. Pastor gave the devotion for the meeting. Bill asked for the roll to be called. Minutes from last meeting could not be approved. They were reviewed.

Board of Education - They are looking at 100 kids for the upcoming Sunday School year.

Elders Report - Bill Nelson is trying to make sure every event is covered.

Property Management – The items repaired by property management were: new doors on garage, faucet in cemetery fixed, back stairway fixed in education building, back light was fixed, eaves were cleaned out.

Finance Committee- Jim showed statements for June and July. During July the income was \$29,000 but the church had total expenses of \$37,000 so there was a shortfall. Better than last year at the same time period, though. Jim has a list of the total of various accounts and funds. Soon the budget will need to be put together for 2012, and Jim would like committees to put together their particular budget for the upcoming year. There was a fire inspection. We have added a sign to the educational door in the back indicating an emergency exit. If there is a power failure, the right hand side is magnetically sealed and will not work

Youth- No report

Dayschool- Vacation Bible school was a great success. The August service is being worked on. The Guardian Angel program will be started and Jamie will give the congregation more information. The Guardian program basically involves having the congregation keep in touch with a child in the Dayschool. The Dayschool/Sunday School Installation service will be reviewed with Pastor Blohm. Barb is appreciative of the update on the stairs and their inspection. Dayschool is not full yet, but extended care is fuller than it has been. She has a few low-attended afternoon classes. Kindergarten has 30 students.

Pastor Report - He also had positive feedback about VBS. 7th grade catechism class will be larger than last year. No transfers in or out. He is looking at a new Bible study from Crossways. The Synod Assembly in May contained no surprises for congregations.

Old Business - None

New Business- Bill has been reviewing different financing for the parking lot by checking new interest rates. Today there is hardly any interest being made on the special funds. Special funds would be willing to pay off the loan for the parking lot and then give the church a 5% loan to pay back special funds. It would save on interest by about \$16,000. The interest would go back to the special funds. Basically the church would be financing themselves. Bill took a vote to see if people would be in favor of this. He will work at contacting the other members.

Special funds committee needs another person to replace Fred Saelzler. This person would need to administer the fund and make recommendations of what to do with the money.

He also talked about current council vacancies and ones that will come up at the end of the year. He is putting together a committee to find new people.

The cemetery renovation has begun. They have fixed the stones. Special funds committee has recommended to give Jay Emch gift certificates for a token of the hours he has put in. Jim recommended a small stipend to pay him for his time and the materials he uses to straighten out the stones.

The Toledo Symphony is coming, and Bill is going to start raising money to fund their night here in December.

Bill ended the meeting. Members stood and recited the Lord's Prayer.
