## **DAYSCHOOL NEWS/HISTORY**



Dear Friends,



And they ate and were well filled, for He gave them what they craved. — Psalm 73:29

As teachers of the Dayschool we know we have a responsibility to give children what they crave. They crave the same thing as adults—a relationship with God. Throughout the day there are many "teachable moments" to show children His amazing love, to draw them closer to Him, and to let them know He is always with them and they can trust in Him. How blessed are we! I want to share the history of the Dayschool as heard during the May 20<sup>th</sup> service. As a congregation, you should be so proud of this seed planting ministry you support. A sincere thanks to those involved in bringing life to this school and, in so doing, bringing eternal life to countless number of children and families.

#### The Start of the Dayschool

Brenda Alvarado, a Dayschool founder: I was taking my daughter, Jill, to a Montessori preschool at a church on Collingwood. She needed to make her way up two flights of stairs by herself because I usually had her handicapped brother with us. Also, there was the expense. She loved school. When I looked around in Oregon, there was not such a choice. First St. John was the second church that I approached. The pastor was Rev. John Underdahl. Charles Neal was on the council that approved the start of a day school. My son, Jeff, had attended a preschool called Opportunity Kindergarten run by Easter Seals. They had a great format. Each child did three "work jobs," which could be matching, puzzles, finding differences, etc. Then they could choose a play activity. That school was at the Libby House by the Toledo Museum of Art. The freedom of movement at the Montessori school was perfect for young children. We copied many things: snacks for example, became a choice. One table was set up for two at a time to be able to serve and clean up after themselves when they wanted to have a snack. Other choices were a water table, book section, play house, large blocks and trucks, painting or crafting, a tree stump for pounding nails, etc. Jeanette Robinson was very creative with a morning lesson. I remember her talking about constellations and making telescopes from paper towel rolls. She covered one end with tissue that had holes poked in it to look like the constellation. I remember having lessons about musical instruments. Every week was different. One time she popped popcorn with the lid off so it could fly around the circle. Unfortunately for Donna's daughter Gretchen, one hot kernel hit her. Donna had three children in the original eleven. They were Brooke, Brent, and Gretchen. My daughter Jill was part of that group, and once in a while my son Jeff would join us. We are so happy to see the growth and success. And it grew quickly.

<u>Donna Koenker, School Administrator 1979 -1986</u>: First St. John Dayschool began in the fall of 1976. At the time there were few preschools in the area. Daycare was just beginning, but a Monday/Wednesday/Friday or Tuesday/ Thursday preschool program was not available in the Oregon area. First St. John Lutheran Church was fulfilling this need for the parents in the vicinity. Jeanette Robinson, Donna Koenker and Brenda Alvarado were the first teachers in the program. Brenda and Donna both had preschoolers and were anxious to have them in a preschool experience. Donna worked for three years without pay so her children could attend the program. The first classes were very small with only 11 children in the sessions. At first, it was totally divided with 3 year olds attending on T/R and 4 year olds attending on M/W/F. After a year we found that parents wanted a choice about when to attend and that the three year-olds gained a lot by having a mixed 3-4 class.

Donna: The tuition for T/R was \$27.00 a month.

Barb: It is now \$95 a month.

Donna: And the M/W/F program cost \$35.00 a month.

Barb: It is now \$115 a month.

<u>Barb Shellhammer, School Administrator 2000 - present</u>: And so it continued under the watchful eye of Judy Cervantes, School Administrator 1986 -2000. My four children attended the Dayschool from 1986 – 1995, so I experienced firsthand the wonderful atmosphere created by my predecessors. As I type this I realize that my first child began during Judy's first year. She led the school with such strength and passion and became a mentor and friend to me as I continued along the same career path. I remember as a young girl going to the next door neighbor of a friend and holding a newborn baby in my arms. The baby was Judy's daughter, and the memory of her welcoming us and sharing her joy with us has always stayed with me. At this same young age, Jeanette Robinson was a part of my church family. She taught Sunday school and was at every gathering. For a couple summers I assisted her in her Vacation Bible School. I find it interesting that God connected me to these women early on and that both would come back into my life to me lead to the spot I am today. I began a preschool in my home church in the late 1980's. Jeanette was there to guide me through the process, and Judy became a constant sounding board. Both women had a faith that was visible, and I appreciated their belief in the ministry of planting seeds of faith in young children. And now the rest of the story...

For many years the mixed age groups continued, and then when The No Child Left Behind Act was signed into law in 2002, we found the kindergarten experience was vanishing. Separating the ages allowed us to provide that experience once more in a pre-kindergarten classroom.

<u>Donna</u>: That first year we started the Thanksgiving dinner, the La Posadas Tradition at Christmas, the eggnog party, and the carnival at the end of the year.

<u>Barb</u>: The Thanksgiving Dinner has now become a Thanksgiving Feast feeding about 800 people. The children prepare the meal, set the table by making placemats and centerpieces, decorate with artwork on the walls, sing a thank you song, and lead us in a prayer of thanksgiving. We still do the Los Posadas tradition where the children walk through the church knocking at the doors of the classrooms and church rooms asking if anyone has room for Baby Jesus. They eventually find Him in a manger in the church and lay their gifts before Him. We have our Christmas chapel at the foot of the manger. Instead of the carnival, we now celebrate the year end with individual class picnics, giving teachers' opportunities to celebrate the year and say special goodbyes to their students.

We also celebrate Halloween with a special chapel that explains to children how faith is growing inside of them and that the light of Jesus shines through them. Our Christmas programs take place in the evening in the beautiful sanctuary of First St. John, and the number of people who attend is astounding. The women of First St. John put together gift bags for each child! We sing in church every spring during a Sunday worship service. And by Easter the children have the Gospel firmly planted in their hearts and are able to tell it to me (in great detail) at the foot of the cross during our Easter chapels in the sanctuary. Parent involvement is encouraged, and many parents are present at the chapel services. They are always brought to tears by the young verbalization of faith. We also now have an evening kindergarten graduation ceremony in the sanctuary. Pomp and Circumstance, caps and gowns, songs, and memory sharing all help to mark the completion of the first year of formal education for our students.

<u>Donna</u>: Before long, enrollment soared and we began a morning and afternoon session of each group. In the fall of 1979 the kindergarten was established. There were requests from parents to expand, and we went with the need. Donna moved to teach the kindergarteners and new teachers and aides were hired.

<u>Barb</u>: Our second extended care started in 2001; our summer program started in 2003; our five day prekindergarten morning and afternoon started in 2005; our August Teacher Installation Service started in 2009; we added scholarship distribution to the August service in 2010; our second kindergarten began in 2010; our May Kindergarten Recognition Service began in 2010; By Design (an outreach ministry to young mothers) began in 2011, as did the Prayer Buddy Program where a congregation member lifts a Dayschool student up in prayer for the year. A loud cry to add additional grades is a constant.

Donna: We started attending chapel service each morning, conducted by the pastors. It was a beautiful way to start the day.

Barb: Chapel is still the best part of any day! Now we attend each morning and afternoon. Chapel is still conducted by the pastor and also by me, our teachers and, most recently, Jamie Blazevich.

Donna: A small green bus was purchased and Gene Hagedorn picked up the students and delivered them home again. The bus route was long as we had students from East Toledo, Oregon and Northwood. This soon became cost prohibitive and was discontinued after a year.

Barb: We now have a small white bus for field trips in the summer only, and although he does not drive the bus, we still have Mr. Gene...all the children know him...I am always thankful that he is a piece of their lives and mine!

Donna: The following fall daycare was established. It was very small at first but soon caught on as working parents searched for quality care for their children. We began cooking and serving lunch to those students. The daycare also involved establishing another room area and equipping it with the needed supplies. At this point we were using three rooms in the basement and the kindergarten room upstairs.

Barb: We now use six rooms altogether.

Donna: I was there for 11 years serving as preschool teacher, kindergarten teacher, director and then on the Board of Education for many years after I moved on to Ottawa Hills Elementary.

> We started with 11 children. and now we serve 250 children (school year and summer combined).

Prayer Buddies will meet the person they've been praying for throughout the school year. Oregon Fest is the same day, and the church will be walking in the parade, which is at 4:00. VBS is June 24-28 and 20 kids are already registered. VBS is still in need of volunteers and needs crew leaders as well. JAM sang this past Sunday and did a great job. Betty Hyre did a great job organizing and teaching them songs. JAM flew kites on Sunday during Sunday school. In their last class they will be doing something for Father's Day. Their last Sunday is May 20.

**Elders-**Bill Nelson gave the report. They have one wedding in June. On June 3<sup>rd</sup> we will go to one service at 9:00am. Communion will be on the first Sunday of the month. That Sunday will be the traditional service and alternate from there. June 10<sup>th</sup> is the outdoor service at 9:00 at the Lutheran Home.

**Property Management-**Mike Folk gave the report. He discussed the ballot. The window project passed, the copier passed, the parking lot passed, the loan passed, but the HVAC study did not pass. The window replacement meeting will be this Thursday to discuss details of the replacements. Heating system in education building will be studied for repairs. Building needs foundation work, and that will be looked into for cost and whether it can be done by Property Management. **Dayschool-**Barb Shellhammer gave the report. Kindergarten recognition service is Sunday. There may be a possibility of overflow of people. Set up for eating afterward will be done by Mike Winslow. Barb said that the thought behind the prayer buddy project was a shared ministry that extends to the congregation to make a connection between the church and the school. Last day of school is May 31. Kindergarten graduation is on May 30<sup>th</sup> at 7:00pm. The church will need elders to handle people, screen etc for that night. Cookies are needed as well. Enrollment is normal for this time of year.

Synod Assembly is this weekend at Bowling Green State University.

Dept. of Health has requested the use our building in times of need to dispense vaccinations, or during disasters like tornadoes. There will be a presentation in the future to explain this further.
