n unsettling anxiety, a sense of guilt, a feeling of loss – George was experiencing all of these. Raised in a Christian home, George had remained active as an adult in his parents' church. He thoroughly enjoyed sharing in the life of the congregation. But George had doubts.

George told no one about his doubts except his wife, Janette. He could confide in no one else. What would the people at church think? What would the pastor think? He had never heard anybody else talk about doubt.

George is not alone. To every Christian comes moments of doubt. Some live with doubt constantly. We need to approach doubt in a truthful way, realizing that God honors honesty.

Doubt has a double edge. On the one side it presents danger; on the other, opportunity. We should be thankful that we are suspicious sometimes. Otherwise we would fall prey to every dishonest salesperson, every bad investment, every religious cult. Without some skepticism we would be naïve. But we should also be wary of doubt; for if it is nourished too long it can immobilize or defeat us.

It's all right to have doubts. In times of doubt we respond as our lives have trained us. The brave soldier trembles but falls into line at the battle cry. So the seeking Christian may prove most faithful when wrestling with questions.

Jesus knew that believing would sometimes be difficult for his followers. Hear his understanding words to Thomas: "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen, and yet believe." (John 20:29)

The Bible uses another important word in this context besides doubt – unbelief. These two words are sometimes used interchangeably in the Bible, but

often there is an important difference in what they mean. Doubt is something beyond the individual's ability to control completely. Persistent unbelief involves a person's will. The doubter may long to believe, though his faith is weak. The unbeliever who rejects Christ chooses not to accept, trust, or love God. The doubter is divided within himself. The unbeliever is resolutely disobedient. The danger in not dealing with doubting, however, is that it can lead to unbelief.

But God can also bring blessings to the believer through the very doubt that threatens faith. For doubt often clarifies what faith is. The Danish theologian Soren Kierkegaard realized that faith is not the same as logical certainty. He described faith as a leap. "When we believe, we jump out into the darkness trusting that God is there to catch us. Paul wrote, 'We walk by faith and not by sight."" (2 Corinthians 5:7)

Doubt may serve to remind us of the goodness of God. When the father of a sick boy cried, "I believe; help my unbelief!" he was crying out for stronger faith that his son might be healed (*Mark 9:24*). And Jesus healed the son even though the father's faith was weak. God does not cease to be God even though we doubt him.

Nevertheless, doubt is always cause for concern. It is always troublesome. But sometimes we take ourselves too seriously. Once the disciples came to Jesus asking him to increase their faith. He answered that all they needed was faith "as a mustard seed." *(Luke 17:5-6)*. A mustard seed is not much larger than the period at the end of this sentence.

The issue here is not how much faith we have, rather that we have faith at all. As Jesus responded to the little faith of the sick boy's father, so God hears and answers even our feeblest prayers. Even through small faith God works miracles.

As we think of February – we are reminded of Valentine's Day. So - When did it all start?

There are various theories on the origin of Valentine's Day, but the most popular dates back to the time of the Roman Empire during the reign of Claudius II, 270 A.D. Claudius didn't want men to marry during wartime because he believed single men made better soldiers. Bishop Valentine went against his wishes and performed secret wedding ceremonies. For this, Valentine was jailed and then executed by order of the Emperor on Feb. 14. While in jail, he wrote a love note to the jailor's daughter, signing it, "From your Valentine." Sound familiar?

More Valentine's Day-Related History

- The ancient Romans celebrated the Feast of Lupercalia on Feb. 14 in honor of Juno, the queen of the Roman gods and goddesses. Juno was also the goddess of women and marriage.
- Many believe the X symbol became synonymous with the kiss in medieval times. People who couldn't write their names signed in front of a witness with an X. The X was then kissed to show their sincerity.
- Girls of medieval times ate bizarre foods on St. Valentine's Day to make them dream of their future spouse.
- In the Middle Ages, young men and women drew names from a bowl to see who would be their Valentine. They would wear this name pinned onto their sleeves for one week for everyone to see. This was the origin of the expression "to wear your heart on your sleeve." In 1537, England's King Henry VII officially declared February 14 the holiday of St. Valentine's Day.

Chocolate

- Physicians of the 1800's commonly advised their patients to eat chocolate to calm their pining for lost love.
- Richard Cadbury produced the first box of chocolates for Valentine's Day in the late 1800's.
- More than 35 million heart-shaped boxes of chocolate will be sold for Valentine's Day. Over \$1 billion worth of chocolate is purchased for Valentine's Day in the U.S.

SOUPER BOWL OF CARING

The Souper Bowl of Caring runs through March 2nd. We will collect money and canned goods through February to help Lutheran Social Services' local food pantry. In 2012, LSS served over 15,000 people with this program. This food pantry is supported entirely by donations of food and money from Lutheran congregations and individuals. A large soup pot is in the Narthex for your donations. When you see the soup pot, consider tossing in a dollar or some change whatever you can donate to this cause. A grocery cart is near the soup pot for depositing any canned good donations you bring. If everyone pitches in, we can go a long way toward helping the hungry right here in the Toledo area. Thank you for your generosity.

In our friendly competition, <u>two</u> grocery carts (thanks, Kroger) are available to collect canned goods—one downstairs in the JAM area and one in the Narthex. The one in the JAM room is for JAM students, choir members, adult Sunday school classes, and the 7th and 8th graders. The one in the Narthex is for the rest of the congregation. We encourage everyone to participate!

Last year we collected 345 food items for LSS! The JAM/Choir/Catechism group had 165, and the congregation had 180. We also collected \$240.76. This year, let's shoot for <u>400</u> food items and <u>\$300</u>, all to be donated to LSS!

Each year First St. John WELCA (\underline{W} omen of the \underline{E} vangelical \underline{L} utheran \underline{C} hurch in \underline{A} merica) does a number of mission projects supporting local and world-wide church agencies and community organizations that provide vital life-enhancing services that share God's love and grace with many people in need.

In an effort to expand the reach of the Women's group, this year the outreach projects will be *shared* with the entire congregation. Each project will have one month of emphasis in 2014 where information about the scope and work of the individual ministry will be shared during Sunday worship. When possible, individuals representing the monthly ministry will be present to share something interesting and inspiring about their work. Date of the sale is Saturday, March 1. Time of sale is 8:30 a.m. (early bird) 9:30 - 1:00

- Friday night set up will be 5 p.m. 8 p.m. Set up will begin at 7:00 a.m. on the morning of the sale. If you are doing Saturday morning set up, there will be **NO setup start after 7:40 a.m**. From approximately 8:00 a.m. to 8:20 a.m. table renters will be allowed to presale at each others' tables. After that, table renters are to be at their table to sell their items to the outside shoppers.
- Due to space available table rental is limited. Registrations will be time stamped in the order they are received. Vendor products must be sold at a separate table.
- Table renters are expected to provide their own change and their own bags. First St. John Lutheran Church and Dayschool will not provide these items. Renters are also expected to act as their own security for items they bring to sell. We cannot be responsible if items or money are stolen from a renter.
- You will be provided a table/space to sell your items from. You must keep your items in the area assigned to you and not have items protruding out into the walkways where they may cause someone to fall or trip. We realize that many sales allow items to go into the aisle. Please respect us as we are respecting the FIRE MARSHALL'S Rules. You may also *rent space for a rack, which you must provide yourself. Your rack must fit into the space provided. 3 Ft between your table and the next table and not extend into the aisle. All items must be behind the front line of your table edge. No clothes hung on the front edge of table.
- Bottled water, gourmet coffee, and snacks will be available for you to purchase.
- You are responsible for pricing and tagging your own items and arranging them in an attractive and orderly manner. This will help you sell your items. For more information, visit the <u>firststjohndayschool.org</u> page for tips on how to sell your items. Items must be clean.
- There is a large item area if you have large items. Please send a picture of your large item with your registration.
- Renters are expected to stay until 1:00 p.m. Renters should not begin to pack up their items to leave before 12:55 p.m. (This if for the sake of those buyers who may be traveling between Resale events).
