Welcome to First St. John Lutheran Church! Please review some of our reopening guidelines below.

Masks must be worn. We have some available to take if you don't have one. Some are cloth masks and can be taken home to wash and reuse. There are also disposable masks.

Please do not congregate in the Narthex (entrance area) either as you arrive or leave.

To minimize direct contact, we will use the outside aisles only for entry and exit. The center aisle will be used for communion, special needs, or emergency exit.

Ushers will fill the pews from the front to the back of the church and dismiss from the back to the front. Please follow their directions. We are sorry everyone cannot have their usual seat.

We will have corporate singing and verbal liturgy responses, <u>as long as we keep our masks on</u>. Dr. Tony and Annette Slater will still provide music. Liturgy and lessons will be projected on the screen. The service will be recorded and published to the website. Future plans are to "live stream" the service.

Elders will wear gloves. You can get a bulletin at the check-in table when you walk in. Please <u>do not leave your bulletin in the pew</u> when you exit; take it home or put it in the recycling bin at the front door.

There is a small wooden church just to the right of the main door when you come in. It has a slot for your offering.

Restrooms are in the church basement. Go to the Narthex (lobby) and take the left set of steps down. The ladies room is at one end of the hallway, and the men's room is at the other. Return to the Narthex using the opposite set of stairs. Please, one person only in the restroom area.

<u>Diaper Changing</u>: A diaper changing table is available in the ladies restroom in the basement of the church.

<u>Flowers</u>: If you would like to sign up for flowers for a Sunday, please call the church office during the week to check on availability.

Thanksgiving For Baptism

All may make the sign of the cross, the sign marked at baptism, as the Thanksgiving begins.

P: Alleluia! Christ is Risen.

C: Christ is risen indeed. Alleluia!

The water is poured into the baptismal font.

- P: Just as God's work of creation never ends, so the gifts received in baptism are renewed every day. Let us give thanks together for the life given in baptism.
- P: We give you thanks, O God, for the waters of life: for water to bathe in, water to drink, for waters to play in and waters that inspire wonder, for water that gives life to our planet.
- C: We give you thanks, O God, for the waters of life.
- P: We give you thanks, O God, for the waters of this place: for water from the faucet, for rain and snow, for the Maumee River, Lake Erie, and all the smaller creeks and streams.
- C: We give you thanks, O God, for the waters of this place.
- P: We give you thanks for your salvation through water: for delivering Noah and his family through the floodwaters, for leading your people Israel through the sea into freedom, for preserving your prophet Elijah through the time of drought, for guiding your people across the Jordan into a new land, for quenching the Samaritan woman's thirst with living water.
- C: We give you thanks, O God, for your salvation through water.
- P: We give you thanks for the life of the baptized, for all who worship in your name, for godparents and baptismal sponsors, for children and grandchildren, for our brothers and sisters in Christ whom we have never seen, but to whom we are bound.
- C: We give you thanks, O God for the life of all baptized.
- P: We give you thanks for life in Christ through your Holy Spirit: for our entry into Jesus' death through these waters; for our new birth into a life of forgiveness of sin, redemption and service; for our calling to be your people, and for being sent out as the body of Christ for the life of the world.

C: We give you thanks, blessed and holy Trinity (+) now and forever. Amen.

<u>Announcements</u>

FIRST READING: Jonah 3:10--4:11

Unlike all other prophetic books, this focuses on the prophet himself rather than Jonah's message. The story begins when Jonah flees God's call to announce the city of Nineveh's destruction, symbolizing all that is hated by the Israelites. This story of a reluctant prophet highlights the very nature of God, who "is gracious and merciful . . . and abounding in steadfast love."

When God saw what the people of Nineveh did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

^{4:1}But this was very displeasing to Jonah, and he became angry. ²He prayed to the LORD and said, "O LORD! Is not this what I said while I was still in my own country?

That is why I fled to Tarshish at the beginning; for I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and ready to relent from punishing. 3And now, O LORD, please take my life from me, for it is better for me to die than to live." ⁴And the LORD said, "Is it right for you to be angry?" 5Then Jonah went out of the city and sat down east of the city, and made a booth for himself there. He sat under it in the shade, waiting to see what would become of the city.

⁶The LORD God appointed a bush, and made it come up over Jonah, to give shade over his head, to save him from his discomfort; so Jonah was very happy about the bush. 'But when dawn came up the next day, God appointed a worm that attacked the bush, so that it withered. 8When the sun rose, God prepared a sultry east wind, and the sun beat down on the head of Jonah so that he was faint and asked that he might die. He said, "It is better for me to die than to live."

⁹But God said to Jonah, "Is it right for you to be angry about the bush?" And he said, "Yes, angry enough to die." ¹⁰Then the LORD said, "You are concerned about the bush, for which you did not labor and which you did not grow; it came into being in a night and perished in a night. 11And should I not be concerned about Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand persons who do not know their right hand from their left, and also many animals?"

GOSPEL: Matthew 20:1-16

Jesus tells his disciples a shocking parable about God's generosity, which reverses human expectations and offends those who believe God gives people only what they

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. ²After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. ³When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; ⁴and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. ⁵When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. ⁶And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' ⁷They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' 8When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first. ⁹When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage.

¹⁰Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. ¹¹And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, ¹²saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' ¹³But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? ¹⁴Take what belongs to you and go: I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. ¹⁵Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' ¹⁶So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

C: And also with you.


P: Lift up your hearts.

Grace for All

It can be unnerving when someone "crashes the line" and ends up in a place ahead of you, especially when you have been waiting patiently along with everyone else. Human beings have a natural sense of fairness and order, and that means we pay attention to things like "first" and "last." So when Jesus tells this last-will-be-first story in today's gospel, we are likely to find our sensibilities challenged. Of course people who work a full day should make more money than those who come on the job an hour before the shift ends!

God calls each of us to work in the vineyard. Some of us have been in the vineyard longer than we can remember. Others of us are recently arrived. And some who gather in the worshiping community this day may be thinking about responding to the landowner's invitation for the first time.

In this vineyard, seniority does not carry much weight. Grace abounds! Not all the workers are always happy about that. However, what appears as God's disregard for the long-time faithful is actually a challenge for all workers to share in God's radical generosity. The only way to be happy as workers in the vineyard is to realize that none of us has a "right" to be here. All of us enter the Christian community as outsiders, even those baptized as infants brought by faithful Christian parents.

If our tasks in the vineyard seem wearisome chores, or if we find ourselves grumbling about God's lack of fairness, it may be time for us to look again at God's incredible openness to all of us who deserve less than what we receive. The cure to our discontent is God's amazing grace and infinite generosity. Get in line! God's about to hand you a paycheck bigger than anything you could ever imagine!
