

Welcome to First St. John Lutheran Church! Please review some of our reopening guidelines below.

Masks must be worn. We have some available to take if you don't have one. Some are cloth masks and can be taken home to wash and reuse. There are also disposable masks.

Please do not congregate in the Narthex (entrance area) either as you arrive or leave.

To minimize direct contact, we will use the outside aisles only for entry and exit. The center aisle will be used for communion, special needs, or emergency exit.

Ushers will fill the pews from the front to the back of the church and dismiss from the back to the front. Please follow their directions. We are sorry everyone cannot have their usual seat.

We will have corporate singing and verbal liturgy responses, <u>as long as we keep our masks on</u>. Dr. Tony and Annette Slater will still provide music. Liturgy and lessons will be projected on the screen. The service will be recorded and published to the website. Future plans are to "live stream" the service.

Elders will wear gloves. You can get a bulletin at the check-in table when you walk in. Please <u>do not leave your bulletin in the pew</u> when you exit; take it home or put it in the recycling bin at the front door.

There is a small wooden church just to the right of the main door when you come in. It has a slot for your offering.

Restrooms are in the church basement. Go to the Narthex (lobby) and take the left set of steps down. The ladies room is at one end of the hallway, and the men's room is at the other. Return to the Narthex using the opposite set of stairs. Please, one person only in the restroom area.

<u>Diaper Changing</u>: A diaper changing table is available in the ladies restroom in the basement of the church.

<u>Flowers</u>: If you would like to sign up for flowers for a Sunday, please call the church office during the week to check on availability.

GOSPEL: Matthew 22:15-22

After Jesus comes to Jerusalem and begins teaching in the temple, the religious leaders try to trap him with trick questions. The first question tries to force him to make an arbitrary choice between devotion to religion or politics.

The Pharisees went and plotted to entrap Jesus in what he said. ¹⁶So they sent their disciples to him, along with the Herodians, saying, "Teacher, we know that you are sincere, and teach the way of God in accordance with truth, and show deference to no one; for you do not regard people with partiality. ¹⁷Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, or not?" ¹⁸But Jesus, aware of their malice, said, "Why are you putting me to the test, you hypocrites? ¹⁹Show me the coin used for the tax." And they brought him a denarius. ²⁰Then he said to them, "Whose head is this, and whose title?" ²¹They answered, "The emperor's." Then he said to them, "Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's." ²²When they heard this, they were amazed; and they left him and went away.

The Great Thanksgiving

P: The Lord be with you.

C: And also with you.

P: Lift up your hearts.

C: We lift them to the Lord.

P: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

C: It is right to give our thanks and praise.

P: It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks and praise to you, almighty and merciful God, through our Savior Jesus Christ. And so, with all the choirs of angels, with the church on earth and the hosts of heaven, we praise your name and join their unending hymn:



- P: Holy, mighty, and merciful Lord, heaven and earth are full of your glory. In great love you sent to us Jesus, your Son, who reached out to heal the sick and suffering, who preached good news to the poor, and who, on the cross, opened his arms to all.

Infants, children and others who have not been baptized are welcome to come to receive a blessing; please make an X with your arms across your chest."

God's Due

What are "God's things?" Are they spiritual rather than material? Are they religious rather than secular? Do they belong to the Sunday world rather than the Monday world?

In today's gospel Jesus is confronted with a question meant to trap him. "Is it lawful to pay taxes . . . or not?" hardly sounds like a trick question to us. But in Jesus' world taxes supported a foreign occupation, and so this question has political overtones. "Jesus, are you a collaborator with the Romans (or are you a revolutionary)?"

Jesus' answer cleverly avoids the trap while shifting the focus to its proper object: "Give to God the things that are God's." Jesus answers a thorny question by reminding us that some things matter more than others. The emperor's claims, as weighty as they may be, are not the ultimate demand upon us. Caesar's authority goes no further than his face on a coin. "The things that are God's" know no limits! The coin, the emperor, the empire--all are God's!

Giving God what belongs to God cannot be calculated by a formula or worked out as a percentage. God's due includes everything--all that I have, all that I am. It includes my possessions, my money, my skills, my personality, my relationships, my history, and my future. All of it is God's. It is not that God is greedy. The bottom line is that, simply, God is God. And that makes us stewards. All that we have, all that we are, all that has been entrusted to our care, is evidence of God's lavish and extravagant generosity. We offer these good gifts--our lives and our possessions--as the hymn of praise we sing to the God who holds the universe.
