

Reformation Sunday

Welcome to First St. John Lutheran Church! Please review some of our reopening guidelines below.

Masks must be worn. We have some available to take if you don't have one. Some are cloth masks and can be taken home to wash and reuse. There are also disposable masks.

Please do not congregate in the Narthex (entrance area) either as you arrive or leave.

To minimize direct contact, we will use the outside aisles only for entry and exit. The center aisle will be used for communion, special needs, or emergency exit.

Ushers will fill the pews from the front to the back of the church and dismiss from the back to the front. Please follow their directions. We are sorry everyone cannot have their usual seat.

We will have corporate singing and verbal liturgy responses, <u>as long as we keep our masks on</u>. Dr. Tony and Annette Slater will still provide music. Liturgy and lessons will be projected on the screen. The service will be recorded and published to the website. Future plans are to "live stream" the service.

Elders will wear gloves. You can get a bulletin at the check-in table when you walk in. Please <u>do not leave your bulletin in the pew</u> when you exit; take it home or put it in the recycling bin at the front door.

There is a small wooden church just to the right of the main door when you come in. It has a slot for your offering.

Restrooms are in the church basement. Go to the Narthex (lobby) and take the left set of steps down. The ladies room is at one end of the hallway, and the men's room is at the other. Return to the Narthex using the opposite set of stairs. Please, one person only in the restroom area.

<u>Diaper Changing</u>: A diaper changing table is available in the ladies restroom in the basement of the church.

<u>Flowers</u>: If you would like to sign up for flowers for a Sunday, please call the church office during the week to check on availability.

Liturgy of Holy Baptism

Presentation of Candidate

P: In baptism our gracious heavenly Father frees us from sin and death by joining us to the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are born children of a fallen humanity; by water and the Holy Spirit we are reborn children of God and made members of the church, the body of Christ. Living with Christ and in the communion of saints, we grow in faith, love, and obedience to the will of God.

P: Called by the Holy Spirit, trusting in the grace and love of God, do you desire to have Vincent Anthony and Luca Paul Donofrio baptized into Christ?

Parents: I do.

<u>Address to the Families</u> – (Pastor, Parents, Sponsors, & Congregation. This concludes with the pastor addressing the congregation:)

P: People of God, do you promise to support Vincent Anthony and Luca Paul and pray for them in their new life in Christ?

C: We do.

Profession of Faith – (Pastor, Parents, & Congregation)

P: I ask you to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin, and confess the faith of the church.

P: Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God? Response: I renounce them.

P: Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God? Response: I renounce them..

P: Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God? Response: I renounce them.

(The congregation joins in the Creed:)

P: Do you believe in God the Father?

C: I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

P: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

C: I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

P: Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

C: I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Thanksgiving at the Font – (Pastor)

P: The Lord be with you.

C: And also with you.

P: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

C: It is right to give our thanks and praise.

P: We give you thanks, O God . . .

Baptism – (Pastor, Family & Candidate)

Signing and Sealing – (Pastor)

Welcome (please stand) - (Pastor & Congregation)

P: Let us welcome the newly baptized.

C: We welcome you into the body of Christ and into the mission we share: join us in giving thanks and praise to God and bearing God's creative and redeeming word to all the world.

(The service continues with the pastor at the altar.)

Invocation

P: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

C: And also with you.

Prayer of the Day

P: Let us pray. Almighty God, gracious Lord, we thank you that your Holy Spirit renews the church in every age. Pour out your Holy Spirit on your faithful people. Keep them steadfast in your word, protect and comfort them in times of trial, defend them against all enemies of the gospel, and bestow on the church your saving peace, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

C: Amen.

Announcements

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:31-34

In contrast to Judah's sin, which Jeremiah describes as "engraved on the tablet of their hearts" (17:1), the prophet envisions a day when the law will be written "on their hearts" (31:33). To know God in this way is to have a direct and profound connection to Him. Forgiveness of sins, which is so complete as to be forgotten, is the motivating force for keeping the law.

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ³²It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt--a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. ³³But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. ³⁴No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Reader: Word of God. Word of life.

C: Thanks be to God.

PSALM: Psalm 46

The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our stronghold. (Ps. 46:4)

God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.

²Therefore we will not fear, though the earth be moved, and though the mountains be toppled into the depths of the sea;

³though its waters rage and foam,

and though the mountains tremble at its tumult.

⁴The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our stronghold.

⁵There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy habitation of the Most High.

God is in the midst of her; she shall not be overthrown; God shall help her at the break of day.

⁷The nations make much ado, and the kingdoms are shaken; God has spoken, and the earth shall melt away.

⁸The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our stronghold.

⁹Come now and look upon the works of the LORD, what awesome things he has done on earth.

¹⁰It is he who makes war to cease in all the world; he breaks the bow, and shatters the spear, and burns the shields with fire.

¹¹"Be still, then, and know that I am God;

I will be exalted among the nations; I will be exalted in the earth."

SECOND READING: Romans 3:19-28

Martin Luther and other Reformation leaders believed the heart of the gospel was found in these words Paul wrote to the Romans. All people have sinned, but God offers forgiveness of sins through Christ Jesus. We are justified, or put right with God, through faith in Jesus.

Now we know that whatever the law says, it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. ²⁰For "no human being will be justified in his sight" by deeds prescribed by the law, for through the law comes the knowledge of sin.

²¹But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed, and is attested by the law and the prophets, ²²the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, ²³since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; ²⁴they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. He did this to show his righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over the sins previously committed; ²⁶it was to prove at the present time that he himself is righteous and that he justifies the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Then what becomes of boasting? It is excluded. By what law? By that of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law.

Reader: Word of God. Word of life.

C: Thanks be to God.

P: The Gospel according to St. John, Chapter 8.

GOSPEL: John 8:31-36

True freedom is not related to ethnic distinctions or social class. Only Jesus can free us from slavery to sin, and he does this through the truth of the gospel.

Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; ³² and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." ³³They answered him, "We are descendants of Abraham and have never been slaves to anyone. What do you mean by saying, 'You will be made free'?"

³⁴Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. ³⁵The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. ³⁶So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed."



Gift Receipt

Some gifts can be hard to receive. In today's second reading Paul speaks of such a gift. He says that we are "justified by God's grace as a gift." Is that good news? Absolutely! But it is good news that runs counter to our experience and expectations. Most of us prefer to earn our own way in the world. We work hard, take pride in our accomplishments, and relish our hard-won victories. When we get ourselves into trouble, we feel like we should work things out by ourselves. How else can we redeem ourselves in our own and others' eyes?

To accept God's gift of justification--the good news that we are freed and forgiven--means acknowledging two painful realities. First, we must admit that we *need* this gift because we mess up continually. Second, we need to recognize that there is nothing we can do to make things right again. That hurts!

The good news begins to feel like good news once we realize that this gift of justification flows from God's gracious heart. God solves our dilemma without saying "I told you so!" or "See what a mess you made?" or even giving us "the look." God loves us, sins and all. And God is always ready to rescue sinners from the messes they have gotten themselves into.

Once we begin to accept this gift--once we are justified by God's gracious heart made known in Jesus--we are righteous in a new way. God is changing us from the inside out. By the power of the Holy Spirit we are freed from the addictive loop of trying harder and failing again. We are freed from having to redeem ourselves. God's free gift can be hard to take, but when we begin to trust God's gracious love we become sinners-in-truth who have begun a life of continuing reformation.
