

Welcome to First St. John Lutheran Church! Please review some of our reopening guidelines below.

Masks must be worn. We have some available to take if you don't have one. Some are cloth masks and can be taken home to wash and reuse. There are also disposable masks.

Please do not congregate in the Narthex (entrance area) either as you arrive or leave.

To minimize direct contact, we will use the outside aisles only for entry and exit. The center aisle will be used for communion, special needs, or emergency exit.

Ushers will fill the pews from the front to the back of the church and dismiss from the back to the front. Please follow their directions. We are sorry everyone cannot have their usual seat.

Due to increased cases of Covid in Lucas County, we are returning to no corporate singing or spoken responses. Dr. Tony and Annette Slater will provide music. The service will be recorded and published to the website. Future plans are to "live stream" the service.

Elders will wear gloves. You can get a bulletin at the check-in table when you walk in. Please <u>do not leave your bulletin in the pew</u> when you exit; take it home or put it in the recycling bin at the front door.

There is a small wooden church just to the right of the main door when you come in. It has a slot for your offering.

<u>Restrooms</u> are in the church basement. Go to the Narthex (lobby) and take the left set of steps down. The ladies room is at one end of the hallway, and the men's room is at the other. Return to the Narthex using the opposite set of stairs. Please, one person only in the restroom area.

<u>Diaper Changing</u>: A diaper changing table is available in the ladies restroom in the basement of the church.

<u>Flowers</u>: If you would like to sign up for flowers for a Sunday, please call the church office during the week to check on availability.

ORDER OF WORSHIP

Opening Hymn "Hark! A Thrilling Voice is Sounding" (v. 1 & 3-5) (sung by Annette)

Invocation

- P: Blessed be the holy Trinity (+) one God, the Lord of Israel who comes to set us free, the mighty Savior who comes to show mercy, the Dawn from on high who guides us into peace. Amen.

- P: As we light these candles, turn our wills to bear the fruit of repentance, transform our hearts to live in justice and harmony with one another, and fix our eyes on the root of Jesse, Jesus Christ, the hope of all nations.
- P: People of hope, come, let us rejoice in the faithfulness of the Lord. Amen.

On Nov. 2, Hurricane Eta, a powerful Category 4 storm, hit Nicaragua, Honduras and Guatemala. Throughout Central America, at least 171 people died. Winds as high as 150 mph caused power outages and structural damage while heavy rains caused catastrophic flooding and landslides, damaging homes, crops, roads and bridges. Just two weeks later, Hurricane lota made landfall in Nicaragua, 15 miles from where Hurricane Eta had made landfall. Iota was the first Category 5 hurricane of the 2020 season, bringing strong winds and rains to areas already devastated by Hurricane Eta, hampering any ongoing recovery.

To assess the immediate needs and initiate a response, Lutheran Disaster Response is engaging with many companion churches and ecumenical partners in the region. While the extent of the damage is not yet known, we will accompany devastated communities from immediate relief through long-term recovery. This is an important part of Christ's call on our church.

If you can help, your gifts designated for "Hurricane Response" will be used entirely (100%) for our direct response. There are various ways to help— by check, over the phone by credit card, or online.

Setting the Table

The coming of John the Baptist to prepare the way of the Lord may be compared to someone making the necessary arrangements for a fine dinner to be celebrated. To ensure that the guests will be aware of the feast to come, invitations are issued and calendars cleared. Obstacles in the way are dealt with and the smallest details carefully planned for this much anticipated, though yet unrealized, banquet.

Many people considered John to be the Messiah. He was born in messiah-like circumstances attended by wonders. John lived in the wilderness, spoke with authority, and behaved exactly as some people thought the real Messiah would. It almost seemed as though there was confusion about who was who.

John "prepared the table the right way," so to speak, but then stepped aside to open the door to the banquet celebrations. John was not the Messiah, but only prepared the way. He was not the host of the meal, but God's emissary to remind the guests of the coming feast and to encourage those invited to get ready.

Someday, the heavenly banquet will begin. Then we will not need to come to holy communion anymore to be with Christ. We will not have to rely on the bread broken for us, or the cup poured out for us, to sustain us. At that time John the Baptist and the whole company of heaven will stand aside. The anticipated hour will have finally come! Jesus, our heavenly host, will invite us to dine with all the saints at the heavenly banquet. Jesus will be at our very sides.

In the meantime, like John the Baptist, remove the obstacles and excuses and prepare for the advent of Christ!
