

Welcome to First St. John Lutheran Church on this Ash Wednesday. In the light of our Covid-19 protocols, please review some of our guidelines below.

Masks must be worn. We have some available to take if you don't have one. Some are cloth masks and can be taken home to wash and reuse. There are also disposable masks.

Please do not congregate in the Narthex (entrance area) either as you arrive or leave.

To minimize direct contact, we will use the outside aisles only for entry and exit. The center aisle will be used for communion, special needs, or emergency exit.

Ushers will fill the pews from the front to the back of the church and dismiss from the back to the front. Please follow their directions. We are sorry everyone cannot have their usual seat.

NOTE: We can speak the congregational responses behind our masks. Dr. Tony will provide music. The service will be recorded and published to the website. We are now live streaming the service on our church website, www.firststjohn.com

Elders will wear gloves. You can get a bulletin at the check-in table when you walk in. Please do not leave your bulletin in the pew when you exit; take it home or put it in the recycling bin at the front door.

There is a small wooden church just to the right of the main door when you come in. It has a slot for your offering.

<u>Restrooms</u> are in the church basement. Go to the Narthex (lobby) and take the left set of steps down. The ladies room is at one end of the hallway, and the men's room is at the other. Return to the Narthex using the opposite set of stairs. Please, one person only in the restroom area.

<u>Diaper Changing</u>: A diaper changing table is available in the ladies restroom in the basement of the church.

Processional "Savior, When in Dust to You" No. 601

Confession

P: Dear brothers and sisters of our Lord Jesus Christ, on this day the Church begins a holy season of prayerful and penitential reflection. Our attention is especially directed to the holy sufferings and death of our Lord Jesus Christ.

From ancient times the season of Lent has been kept as a time of special devotion, self-denial, and humble repentance born of a faithful heart that dwells confidently on His Word and draws from it life and hope.

With that in mind, this year the theme for our Lenten worship will focus upon the journey, and our overall theme will be "Return from Exile: A Lenten Journey." We begin our journey today wearing sackcloth and ashes while lamenting our sins. We then complete our journey rising with Christ out of Baptism, wearing robes of righteousness.

Let us pray that our dear Father in heaven, for the sake of His beloved Son and in the power of His Holy Spirit, might richly bless this Lententide for us so that we may come to Easter with glad hearts and keep the feast in sincerity and truth.

Silence for reflection and self-examination.

P: Most holy and merciful Father:

C: we confess to you and to one another and to the whole communion of saints in heaven and on earth: we have sinned in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.

- P: By the mystery of Your holy incarnation; by Your holy nativity; by Your Baptism, fasting, and temptation; by Your agony and bloody sweat; by Your cross and passion; by Your precious death and burial; by Your glorious resurrection and ascension; and by the coming of the Holy Spirit, the Comforter:
- C: Help us, good Lord.
- P: In all time of our tribulation; in all time of our prosperity; in the hour of death; and in the day of judgment:
- C: Help us, good Lord.
- P: We poor sinners implore You
- C: to hear us, O Lord.
- P: To prosper the teaching of Your Word; to bless our prayer and meditation; to strengthen and preserve us in the true faith; and to give heart to our sorrow and strength to our repentance:
- C: We implore You to hear us, good Lord.
- P: To draw all to Yourself; to bless those who are instructed in the faith; to watch over and console the poor, the sick, the distressed, the lonely, the forsaken, the abandoned, and all who stand in need of our prayers; to give abundant blessing to all works of mercy; and to have mercy on us all:
- C: We implore You to hear us, good Lord.
- P: To turn our hearts to You; to turn the hearts of our enemies, persecutors, and slanderers; and graciously to hear our prayers:
- C: We implore You to hear us, good Lord.
- P: Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God,
- C: we implore You to hear us.
- P: Christ, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world,
- C: have mercy.
- P: Christ, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world,
- C: grant us Your peace.

(The Congregation is seated)

IMPOSITION OF ASHES (Those who desire to receive ashes come forward as directed.)

(The Congregation stands)

P: Accomplish in us, O God, the work of your salvation,

C: that we may show forth your glory in the world.

P: By the cross and Passion of your Son, our Lord,

C: bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.

P: Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, you do not desire the death of sinners, but rather that they turn from their wickedness and live. Therefore, we implore you to grant us true repentance and your Holy Spirit, that those things which we do on this day may please you, that the rest of our lives may be pure and holy, and that at the last we may come to your eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

C: Amen.

Prayer of the Day

P: The Lord be with you.

C: And also with you.

P: Let us pray. Almighty and ever-living God, you hate nothing you have made, and you forgive the sins of all who are penitent. Create in us new and honest hearts, so that, truly repenting of our sins, we may receive from you, the God of all mercy, full pardon and forgiveness through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

C: Amen.

The Service of the Word

FIRST READING: Joel 2:1-2, 12-17

Blow the trumpet in Zion;

sound the alarm on my holy mountain!

Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble,

GOSPEL: Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven.

²"So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ³But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, ⁴so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

⁵"And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ⁶But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

¹⁹"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; ²⁰but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Infants, children and others who have not been baptized are welcome to come to receive a blessing.

If you wish to receive apple juice instead of wine, place your hand over your shoulder as you approach the person distributing the wine.

(After all have returned to their seats, the Congregation stands.)

P: The body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ strengthen and sustain you in God's grace.

C: Amen.

P: Let us pray. Merciful God, accompany our journey through these forty days. Renew us in the gift of baptism, that we may provide for those who are poor, pray for those in need, fast from self-indulgence and above all, that we may find our treasure in the life of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

C: Amen.

Benediction

Sign of Death and Life

Soaring buildings of steel and concrete--these can smolder into ravines of ash. Damp, green forests of moss-cloaked trees can burn into ash-covered skeletal remains. Mountain peaks can detonate from buried, churning cauldrons that carry ash skyward and drop it on meadows and beaches miles away. Fathers and mothers, sisters and brothers, sons and daughters-they too give bones and flesh, warm blood and familiar voice over to ash. "Ashes to ashes, dust to dust" says the pastor, standing by a hole in the ground. There is a place like this for all of us.

An uncomfortable gloominess pesters us on this day, Ash Wednesday. Without hesitation the sober announcement finds our ears and more importantly our hearts: "Remember that you are dust." Many of us will be marked on our brows with the same symbol that signed us at our baptism. The sign of the cross will be impressed upon our flesh. However today the imprint is gray ash, the remains of dying embers, and not the oil of anointing for someone freshly risen from baptismal water.

How is it that we come to this place of worship and take on this awfully transformed symbol? The joyous, watery, baptismal birth mark is changed into the fearful, gritty Ash Wednesday death mark. Is there not enough ruin and sorrow in our lives and in our world without welcoming its imprint here in worship?

Yet isn't it precisely here that we need to encounter this sign of mortality? Here, in the shadow of the cross, we can accept this truth. For to honestly face our death is to begin meeting the wonder of life in Christ. "Send me the grace my spirit needs," we pray with Martin Luther (LBW 295), "without it I am nothing." To admit that we are indeed helplessly sinful, sliding toward death, is the first step toward repentance and reclaiming our baptismal birthright.
