

There is a small wooden church just to the right of the main door when you come in. It has a slot for your offering.

<u>Nursery</u> is in the church basement and is currently unstaffed; you are welcome to sit with your child. A diaper changing table is available in the ladies restroom in the basement of the church.

<u>Restrooms</u> are in the church basement. Go to the Narthex (lobby) and take either set of steps to the basement hallway. The ladies room is at one end, and the men's room is at the other.

<u>Flowers</u>: If you would like to sign up for altar flowers, there is a book in the Narthex (lobby) by the telephone. Or, you can call the church office during the week to check on availability.

Memorials: If you wish to give a memorial in honor or memory of a loved one, you may mail it in or pick up a memorial card in the church office or in the Narthex (lobby) and place it in the offering plate.

READING: Ephesians 1:7-14

The epistle to the Ephesians begins with thanksgiving and praise to God. Above all, God is blessed for the glorious grace bestowed on us in Christ.

In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace ⁸that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight ⁹he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, ¹⁰as a plan for the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth.

¹¹In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, ¹²so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; ¹⁴this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

GOSPEL: Mark 6:14-29

As Jesus and his disciples begin to attract attention, Mark recalls the story of John the Baptist's martyrdom. Like John, Jesus and his disciples also will suffer at the hands of those opposed to the gospel of salvation.

King Herod heard of [the disciples' preaching,] for Jesus' name had become known. Some were saying, "John the baptizer has been raised from the dead; and for this reason these powers are at work in him." ¹⁵But others said, "It is Elijah." And others said, "It is a prophet, like one of the prophets of old." ¹⁶But when Herod heard of it, he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised."

¹⁷For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. ¹⁸For John had been telling Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." ¹⁹And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, ²⁰ for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him. ²¹But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. ²²When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it." ²³And he solemnly swore to her, "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom." ²⁴She went out and said to her mother, "What should I ask for?" She replied, "The head of John the baptizer." ²⁵Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, "I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter." ²⁶The king was deeply grieved; yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her.

²⁷Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, ²⁸brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. ²⁹When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.

SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Death of a Prophet

Today we encounter God's power even in a disturbing story. John the Baptist rightfully confronted King Herod about his unlawful and unnatural marriage to his brother's wife, Herodias. Angered by John's comments, Herodias persuades Herod to arrest and imprison him. In her grudge against John, she uses her own daughter to seek revenge.

At Herod's birthday party, Herodias has her daughter (Herod's niece, now stepdaughter!) dance for him; not a little girl's dance recital but something erotic, designed to manipulate Herod. He makes a rash promise to the girl who runs straight to her mother for instructions. Herod doesn't have the guts to retract his oath when he realized he's been outfoxed by his wife. He's the king! He could reverse his own order; but he's worried about embarrassing himself further in front of his guests by going back on his word.

We can note the contrast between Herod, who liked to watch and listen to what was stimulating but could not be stirred to act with justice, and the disciples of John. Their commitment to their teacher kept them alert and near enough to come and accord his body final dignity. Their love moved them to risky action. Strange that even with his severed head on a platter, the prophet John holds more power than the weak king. This death reminds us of another tragic story, another innocent man, arrested and killed for telling the truth. This one carried upon him the sins of the world.

Worship transforms us from spectators into participants. The words addressed to us and expressed by us pull us into commitment. Worship draws us into relationships with God and with one another in the body of Christ. Our commitment to these relationships inspires us to action: we are moved nearer, perhaps, to those in danger, bearing witness against injustice and restoring dignity in a suffering world.
