

For your offering, there is a small wooden church just to the right of the main door when you come in. It has a slot in it for your offering.

<u>Nursery</u> is in the church basement and is currently unstaffed; you are welcome to sit with your child. A diaper changing table is available in the ladies restroom in the basement of the church.

<u>Restrooms</u> are in the church basement. Go to the Narthex (lobby) and take either set of steps to the basement hallway. The ladies room is at one end, and the men's room is at the other.

<u>Flowers</u>: If you would like to sign up for altar flowers, there is a book in the Narthex (lobby) by the telephone. Or, you can call the church office during the week to check on availability.

Memorials: If you wish to give a memorial in honor or memory of a loved one, you may mail it in or pick up a memorial card in the church office or in the Narthex (lobby) and place it in the offering plate.

### **SECOND READING: Ephesians 4:1-8**

Previously, Paul has declared that, through grace, Christ has reconciled all people to God and to each other. Now he traces the specific consequences of this reconciliation for Christian communities that are diverse in their unity.

I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, <sup>2</sup> with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, <sup>3</sup>making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. <sup>4</sup>There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, 5 one Lord, one faith, one baptism, <sup>6</sup>one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all.

**GOSPEL: John 6:24-35** 

Many of the five thousand people Jesus fed in the wilderness continued to follow him through the countryside. He challenges them to consider the real nature of their quest.

When the crowd saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were beside the sea, they

themselves got into the boats and went to Capernaum looking for Jesus.

<sup>25</sup>When they found him on the other side of the sea, they said to him, "Rabbi, when did you come here?" <sup>26</sup>Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. <sup>27</sup>Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For it is on him that God the Father has set his seal." <sup>28</sup>Then they said to him, "What must we do to perform the works of God?" <sup>29</sup>Jesus answered them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent." <sup>30</sup>So they said to him, "What sign are you going to give us then, so that we may see it and believe you? What work are you performing? <sup>31</sup>Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.' " <sup>32</sup>Then Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. <sup>33</sup>For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." <sup>34</sup>They said to him, "Sir, give us this bread always."

<sup>35</sup>Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty."

## **The Great Thanksgiving**

# **Never Be Hungry**

Empty mouths water, empty stomachs growl, empty hands reach out for food and drink. Empty pockets mean empty plates and empty places as members of the community weaken and fall. Extreme hunger and thirst can scare even liberated slaves into nostalgia for bondage. Regular meals would seem preferable to starving to death in freedom. In ancestral times God heard the cries of the Israelites and sent something they didn't recognize: manna, a new kind of bread.

In today's gospel, the crowd members get in their boats to come looking for Jesus. He fed them; they ate their fill; it felt good. He enjoins them not to chase around for food that perishes, but pursue the food that endures. "Food" is a metaphor for teaching, which fills emptiness of mind and heart. The perishable sort is an experience that feels good temporarily but will not sustain over the long run: a sugar high from junk food rather than the slow inward building of tissue wrought by nutritional fare. The food that endures--not always instantly recognized--is what strengthens us to persevere not only in times of prosperity or celebration, but also through tragedy and failure.

If the crowd is not to work at chasing after religious highs, what is asked of them is to believe in the one God has sent. They want a sign to prove why they should do so. Jesus fed them miraculously the day before, but what about today? "Our ancestors ate manna in the wilderness"--bread that appeared in just the right quantities morning by morning.

Jesus calls himself the true manna from heaven: "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty." In his presence--in word and sacrament and personal devotion--we recognize and gather up our daily and enduring bread. With food and freedom together we are filled, satisfied, blessed.
