Covid Guidelines: If you are fully vaccinated, you do not need to wear a mask. However, if you have not been vaccinated, please continue wearing a mask. We have some available near the entryway if you don't have one.

<u>Livestream and Recorded Worship</u>: We livestream the service on our church website at www.firststjohn.com. Also, the service will be recorded and published to the website.

<u>Adult Sunday School</u> meets at 9:15 am in the lounge (middle floor of the educational building – turn right out of the door by the choir loft).

<u>Children ages 3 through 5th grade</u> will meet for Sunday School in the basement of the church (the JAM Room!).

<u>Catechism Class</u>: Class will be held from 9:15 to 10:15 am each Sunday.

<u>Nursery</u> is in the church basement and is currently unstaffed; you are welcome to sit with your child. A diaper changing table is available in the ladies restroom in the basement of the church.

<u>Restrooms</u> are in the church basement. Go to the Narthex (lobby) and take either set of steps to the basement hallway. The ladies room is at one end, and the men's room is at the other.

<u>Flowers</u>: If you would like to sign up for altar flowers, there is a book in the Narthex (lobby) by the telephone. Or, you can call the church office during the week to check on availability.

Lighting the First Advent Candle

Isaiah 2:3-4

P: For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem.

⁴He shall judge between the nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore.

P: Blessed are you, O God of Jacob, for you promise to transform weapons of war into implements of planting and harvest, and to teach us your way of peace; you promise that our night of sin is far gone and that your day of salvation is dawning.

(Light the first candle)

P: As we light the first candle on this wreath, wake us from our sleep, wrap us in your light, empower us to live honorably, and guide us along your path of peace.

P: O house of Jacob, come,

C: Let us walk in the light of the Lord. Amen.

Confession and Forgiveness

(All may make the sign of the cross, the sign that is marked at baptism)

P: Blessed be the holy Trinity,

→ one God, who alone does wonders, who lifts up the lowly, who fills the hungry with good things.

<u>Announcements</u>

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 33:14-16

In the Hebrew scriptures, righteousness is not so much a moral virtue as the fulfillment of the responsibilities of a relationship among people or with God. God acts righteously in speaking against Israel's faithlessness and in working salvation for them. Jerusalem's future name--"The Lord is our righteousness"--serves as a sign the Lord is even now working salvation for the people.

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ¹⁵In those days and at that time I will cause a righteous Branch to spring up for David; and he shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. ¹⁶In those days Judah will be saved and Jerusalem will live in safety. And this is the name by which it will be called: "The LORD is our righteousness."

SECOND READING: 1 Thessalonians 3:9-13

From Timothy, Paul hears about the faithful congregation in Thessalonica and is moved to express his thanks to God. He prays the congregation may grow in love and holiness until "the coming of our Lord Jesus with all the saints."

How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy that we feel before our God because of you? ¹⁰Night and day we pray most earnestly that we may see you face to face and restore whatever is lacking in your faith.

¹¹Now may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus direct our way to you. ¹²And may the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we abound in love for you. ¹³And may he so strengthen your hearts in holiness that you may be blameless before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints.

GOSPEL: Luke 21:25-36

When God brings creation to fulfillment, there will be dismay, perplexity, fright, and shaking heavens. But this vision also has words of assurance: for the faithful, it will be a time not to cower in fear, but to stand boldly and receive God's promised redemption.

[Jesus said:] ²⁵"There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. ²⁶People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. ²⁷Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in a cloud' with power and great glory. ²⁸Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near."

⁵⁹Then he told them a parable: "Look at the fig tree and all the trees; ³⁰as soon as they sprout leaves you can see for yourselves and know that summer is already near. ³¹So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that the kingdom of God is near. ³²Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all things have taken place. ³³Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

³⁴"Be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life, and that day catch you unexpectedly, ³⁵like a trap. For it will come upon all who live on the face of the whole earth. ³⁶Be alert at all times, praying that you may have the strength to escape all these things that will take place, and to stand before the Son of Man."

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Cleared Vision

Now and then, the landscapes and images of ancient scripture mirror our own time so eerily that we catch our breath in amazement. Today's gospel provides such an example. Distress among nations. Fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world. Powers shaken. Yes--we know about these things.

Upset and unease around the globe, reported with unrelenting vigor, may at times threaten to overwhelm us. Wars. Biological weapons. Health epidemics. Human cloning. Overpopulation. Famine. Environmental degradation. These are things that may cause general anxiety. But often, the real terrors are the day-to-day fears. Will I have enough to live on in my old age? Does anyone *really* know me? Are my children responsible, healthy, compassionate? Will I ever be happy? Have I made the right decisions about what to do with my life? Is this all there is? These human-scale worries loom large in our imaginations.

When we are haunted by worry, when our notion of who we are and what we are about seems shaken and unsteady, then, oddly enough, we are most prepared to recognize Jesus when he comes. Formidable circumstances, within or beyond our control, can bring us face to face with our need of a savior. Anxious times bring with them this clarity of vision--a vision harder to come by when everything is just as we think it should be.

On this first Sunday in Advent we are reminded again that the coming of Jesus brings only blessed consequences for those who watch for his coming with faith and hope. Jesus' presence does not guarantee a quick end to our anxieties, but does assure us that they will come to an end, and that in the meantime we are never alone. In word, meal, and the gathered body of Christ, we hear and taste and touch the presence of the one who will not let us go.
