<u>Adult Sunday School</u> meets at 9:15 am in the lounge (middle floor of the educational building – turn right out of the door by the choir loft).

<u>Children ages 3 through 5th grade</u> will meet for Sunday School in the basement of the church (the JAM Room!).

<u>Catechism Class</u>: Class will be held from 9:15 to 10:15 am each Sunday.

<u>Nursery</u> is in the church basement and is currently unstaffed; you are welcome to sit with your child. A diaper changing table is available in the ladies restroom in the basement of the church.

<u>Restrooms</u> are in the church basement. Go to the Narthex (lobby) and take either set of steps to the basement hallway. The ladies room is at one end, and the men's room is at the other.

Lighting the Second Advent Candle

Isaiah 11:1-2

P: A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots.

²The spirit of the LORD shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD.

P: Blessed are you, God of hope, for you promise to bring forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse who will being justice to the poor, who will deliver the needy and crush the oppressor, who will stand as a signal of hope for all people.

(Light the second candle)

P: As we light these candles, turn our wills to bear the fruit of repentance, transform our hearts to live in justice and harmony with one another, and fix our eyes on the root of Jesse, Jesus Christ, the hope of all nations.

P: O people of hope, come,

C: let us rejoice in the faithfulness of the Lord. Amen.

Confession and Forgiveness

(All may make the sign of the cross, the sign that is marked at baptism)

P: Blessed be the holy Trinity,

→ one God, who alone does wonders, who lifts up the lowly, who fills the hungry with good things.

C: Amen.

P: Let us confess our sin, trusting in the tender mercy of our God.

FIRST READING: Malachi 3:1-4

The Lord announces a covenant with Israel. A messenger like Malachi (his name means "my messenger") shall prepare a way for the sudden coming of the Lord, who will purify and refine God's people for the offering of pleasing sacrifices.

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the LORD whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight-indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; ³he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. ⁴Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD as in the days of old and as in former years.

PSALM: Luke 1:68-79

In the tender compassion of our God, the dawn from on high shall break upon us.

Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel;

he has come to his people and set them free.

⁷⁰Through his holy prophets he promised of old

⁷¹that he would save us from our enemies,

from the hands of all who hate us.

SECOND READING: Philippians 1:3-11

Paul exhorts Christians to experience love that grows "richer in knowledge and insight of every kind" until the day of Christ Jesus. On that day, the good work begun in them will be flawless, a "full harvest of righteousness."

I thank my God every time I remember you, ⁴constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, ⁵because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ. ⁷It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me, both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel. ⁸For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the compassion of Christ Jesus. ⁹And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight ¹⁰to help you to determine what is best, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, ¹¹having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God.

GOSPEL: Luke 3:1-6

Luke places John in secular history. Yet John's arrival also heralds a new age of salvation. John refers to the words of the prophets, but with a vigorous immediacy: Now is the time to prepare for Christ through a "baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins."

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, ²during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. ³He went into all the region around the Jordan. proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁴as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

> "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord,

make his paths straight.'

⁵'Every valley shall be filled,

and every mountain and hill shall be made low,

and the crooked shall be made straight. and the rough ways made smooth;

⁶and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.' "

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Time and Place

Before John appears against the backdrop of a barren wilderness, the gospel writer sets the stage. Luke provides great detail about who ruled the administrative districts of Palestine in the first century and when. Only after this narrative is fastened to a specific moment in history does Luke tell us that the word of God came to John in the wilderness.

So what? Why does Luke care that we know exactly what time it is? Because Jesus' advent is once for all. It was rooted in history, yet he continues to come to us anew each day. When John appears on the scene proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, it signals a new age of salvation. Now, nothing will ever be the same again. The promised messiah is near, and John's task is to get people ready to meet him.

On this side of John's testimony, we continue what began in his proclamation. Having heard and believed the good news of God's salvation, we bear God's creative and redeeming word to all the world. Rooted in this place, in our own unique contexts, we announce hope to those who live in fear and despair. We are the present-day messengers in a long line of faithful witnesses who pointed to Jesus, the one whose coming ushered in a brand new history for them and for us.

When that new history is obscured by crooked paths and rough ways, we might remember that the word of God came to John in the *wilderness*. John's base of operation was not a political, military, or religious stronghold, but the desert. Our own barren landscapes of doubt, discouragement, or lack of enthusiasm will not keep God from finding us. Our deserts, like John's, are made holy by God's presence. Now, in this time and place, God prepares us to be both recipients and messengers of good news.
