Turning the Tables

"My soul magnifies the Lord. . . . [God] has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty," Mary sang after the angel Gabriel told her she would be the mother of Jesus (Luke 2:46, 52-53). Her hymn of thanksgiving foreshadows a frequent theme in the Gospel of Luke: under God's rule, roles will be reversed.

Interpreters of the parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector, which we heard in today's gospel reading, have sometimes cast the Pharisee as a villain and the tax collector as a hero. The Pharisee, who confidently reminded God of his own faithfulness, and the tax collector, who beat his breast and confessed his own unworthiness, each got what he deserved, we are told. The point of the parable, however, is not about who merited God's favor. The point is that God justified the ungodly tax collector--contrary to what we might expect.

We are reminded daily of the brokenness of our world. Polluted waters and skies are signs that the relationship between humanity and the rest of creation is broken. Wars among nations and feuds within families reflect the brokenness of relationships among people. Our pathetic attempts to rely on ourselves and take charge of our own life are rooted in our broken relationship with God, who alone rules the universe.

Into the heart of all that is broken, however, comes Jesus, and the forces of sin and death are drowned. As we bathe each new member of God's family in the waters of baptism, God works the ultimate reversal: In this new world, righteousness and life reign. As we share in the thanksgiving feast served at God's table, God nourishes us for this new creation. All that was broken has been made whole.



⁷I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. ⁸From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing.



May it not be counted against them! ¹⁷But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed and all the Gentiles might hear it. GOSPEL: Luke 18:9-14

At the time of Jesus, Pharisees were regarded as exceptionally religious persons, and tax collectors were treated as outcasts. Here Jesus contrasts the two in a surprising way to make a point about approaching God in humbleness.

Jesus also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt: ¹⁰"Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. ¹¹The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax collector.
