# Join the Struggle

From the very beginning there is a struggle between good and evil. The serpent tempts Adam and Eve to eat from the forbidden tree. The story reveals our human desire to transcend our limitations and to become like God. It may be the story of Adam and Eve, but the Hebrew word for humanity, *adam*, hints that it is also the story of every man and woman.

We face the same temptation as our ancestors in the garden. We are tempted to do whatever we want, avoid responsibility, and forget the rest of the world. We are tempted to deny our mortality and place the blame on anyone but ourselves--even God.

It is always tempting to point to the evil outside ourselves; to believe that another person, group, or nation is evil but that we are full of good. There is the ever-present danger, too, that we will counter evil with evil and become the very thing we claim to hate. Here our theological tradition sheds light: we are both saint and sinner at the same time. We are created in God's image, and we share in the brokenness of creation.

In their wilderness struggle, the tempter entices Jesus with three things that can make us believe we don't need God: self-sufficiency, pride, and power. Our baptism joins us to this struggle. In our baptism we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from the love of God and neighbor. Repentance, fasting, prayer, and the works of love are Lenten disciplines that help us wage our spiritual warfare.

The battle between good and evil isn't just "out there" somewhere. It lives in all of us, in our nation, in our churches, in our hearts. Lent reminds us to be honest and to wrestle with our temptations, addictions, compulsions, and selfishness. It reminds us, too, that Jesus will be with us in the struggle.



# FIRST READING: Genesis 2:15-17; 3:1-7

Human beings were formed with great care, to be in relationship with the Creator, creation, and one another. This passage recounts the first in a series of stories that depicts the nature of human sin-wanting to be like God.

The LORD God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. <sup>16</sup>And the LORD God commanded the man, "You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; <sup>17</sup>but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die."

<sup>3:1</sup>Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden'?" <sup>2</sup>The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; <sup>3</sup>but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die.' " <sup>4</sup>But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; <sup>5</sup>for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." <sup>6</sup>So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. <sup>7</sup>Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

#### **PSALM: Psalm 32**

Mercy embraces those who trust in the LORD. (Ps. 32:11)

Happy are those whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered.

<sup>2</sup> Happy are those to whom the Lord imputes no iniquity and in whose spirit there is no deceit.

<sup>3</sup> While I kept silent, my body wasted away through my groaning all day long.

<sup>4</sup> For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength was dried up as by the heat of summer.

<sup>5</sup> Then I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not hide my iniquity; I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the Lord," and you forgave the guilt of my sin.

<sup>6</sup> Therefore let all who are faithful offer prayer to you; at a time of distress, the rush of mighty waters shall not reach them.

<sup>7</sup> You are a hiding place for me; you preserve me from trouble; you surround me with glad cries of deliverance.

<sup>8</sup> I will instruct you and teach you the way you should go; I will counsel you with my eye upon you.

<sup>9</sup> Do not be like a horse or a mule, without understanding, whose temper must be curbed with bit and bridle, else it will not stay near you.

<sup>10</sup> Many are the torments of the wicked,

but steadfast love surrounds those who trust in the Lord.

<sup>11</sup> Be glad in the Lord and rejoice, O righteous, and shout for joy, all you upright in heart.

#### **SECOND READING: Romans 5:12-19**

Paul describes the effect of Jesus' obedience versus that of Adam's disobedience. Through Christ, God has reversed the consequences of sin and death to offer the free gift of eternal life.

Just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned--13sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. 14Yet death exercised dominion from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sins were not like the transgression of Adam, who is a type of the one who was to come.

<sup>15</sup>But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many. <sup>16</sup>And the free gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin. For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brings justification. <sup>17</sup>If, because of the one man's trespass, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one man, Jesus Christ.

<sup>18</sup>Therefore just as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all, so one man's act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all. <sup>19</sup>For just as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.

#### **GOSPEL: Matthew 4:1-11**

Jesus experiences the temptations that Israel faced in the wilderness. As the Son of God, he endures the evil one's testing.

Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. <sup>2</sup>He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished. <sup>3</sup>The tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." <sup>4</sup>But he answered, "It is written,

but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.' "
