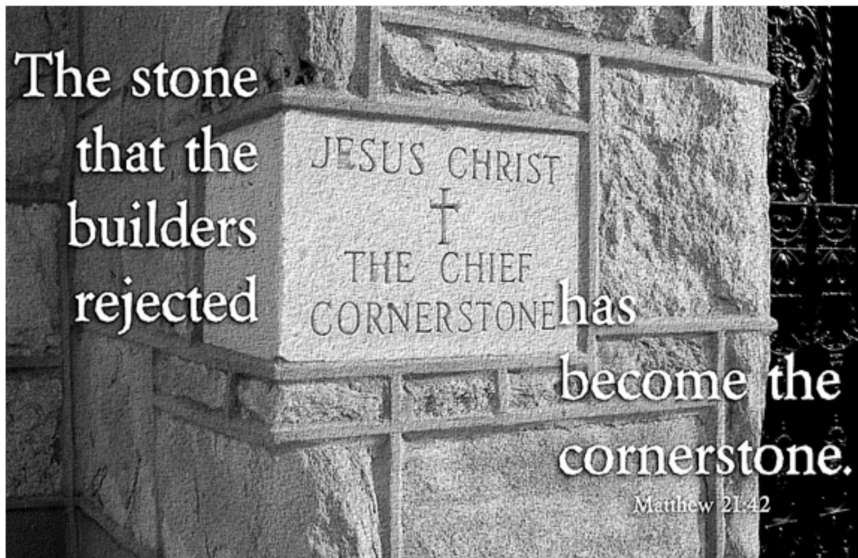

Announcements

Introduction

In today’s gospel reading, Jesus tells a vineyard parable, which serves as an image of Israel, the prophets’ mission, and Christ’s death. For Christians, the vineyard also speaks of God’s love poured out in the blood of Christ, given to us for the forgiveness of sin. Grafted onto Christ the vine at baptism, we are nourished with wine and bread so that we may share Christ’s sufferings and know the power of his resurrection.

FIRST READING: ISAIAH 5:1-7

The prophet sings a sad, parable-like love song about the relationship between God and Israel. In this song Israel is compared to a promising vineyard. Despite God’s loving care, the vineyard that is Israel has brought forth “wild grapes” of injustice and distress, when fine grapes of justice and righteousness were expected.

¹Let me sing for my beloved
my love-song concerning his vineyard:
My beloved had a vineyard
on a very fertile hill.

²He dug it and cleared it of stones,
and planted it with choice vines;
he built a watchtower in the midst of it,
and hewed out a wine vat in it;
he expected it to yield grapes,

but it yielded wild grapes.

³And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem
and people of Judah,
judge between me
and my vineyard.

⁴What more was there to do for my vineyard
that I have not done in it?
When I expected it to yield grapes,
why did it yield wild grapes?

⁵And now I will tell you
what I will do to my vineyard.
I will remove its hedge,
and it shall be devoured;
I will break down its wall,
and it shall be trampled down.

⁶I will make it a waste;
it shall not be pruned or hoed,
and it shall be overgrown with briars and thorns;
I will also command the clouds
that they rain no rain upon it.

⁷For the vineyard of the LORD of hosts
is the house of Israel,
and the people of Judah
are his pleasant planting;
he expected justice,
but saw bloodshed;
righteousness,
but heard a cry!

Gospel Announcement

P: The Gospel according to Matthew Chapter 21.

C: **Glory to you, O Lord.**

GOSPEL: Matthew 21:33-46

Jesus tells a parable to the religious leaders who are plotting his death, revealing that their plans will, ironically, bring about the fulfillment of scripture.

[Jesus said to the people:]³³“Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country.³⁴When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce.³⁵But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another.³⁶Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way.³⁷Finally he sent his son to them, saying, ‘They will respect my son.’³⁸But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, ‘This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance.’³⁹So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him.⁴⁰Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?”⁴¹They said to him, “He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time.”

⁴²Jesus said to them, “Have you never read in the scriptures:

‘The stone that the builders rejected
has become the cornerstone;
this was the Lord’s doing,
and it is amazing in our eyes’?

⁴³Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom.⁴⁴The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls.”

⁴⁵When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them.⁴⁶They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.

Rebuilder

Why would builders "reject" a stone? It could be too weak or too porous or riddled with fractures that might cause it to crumble. Or it could be of such an unusual shape that there would be no way to fit other stones around it to make it a useful part of the structure.

In today's gospel reading Jesus quotes a psalm that speaks about such a rejected stone (Ps. 118:22-23). This unwanted stone becomes an important architectural element in a new kind of structure. The original wording of the psalm could mean this rejected rock is the cornerstone that determines the angles for the rest of the building. Or it could refer to the keystone at the top of an arch that holds the whole structure together. Either way, using a "rejected stone" would create a rather unusual building.

What parts of your life don't fit together right now? What in your life is out of place, awkward, or just plain wrong? Are there challenges or heartaches that threaten to turn carefully built walls--routines, assumptions, lifestyles--into rubble? Where in your life could you use a solid foundation?

Jesus tells his story about a vineyard in rebellion to give his listeners--and us--another chance. His message about God's unconditional love does not fit into the world's structures of accountability. Jesus himself is the rejected stone, the stone that doesn't fit. He affirms his rightful title as Son of God by being executed as a criminal. He is part of God's new plan for building a different reality in the world. And wondrous architect that he is, he is able to take the misfit, crumbling structures of our lives and turn them into something which will amaze our eyes! Let him get to work as the master builder in your life.
