Lighting the Advent Wreath—The Third Candle

- P: This season of preparation is half done, and today we light the third candle of our wreath. It is pink to remind us there is so much about which we should rejoice.
- C: We are a people seeking true joy in the arms of the One who comes to bring it. Even as night continues to lengthen, we sense the coming of light that will brighten our days, so we listen for the Living Word in the words of the prophet.
- P: Every year we light candles as we prepare for the coming of Christ. More and more candles, more and more light, as we watch and wait for Jesus, the Light of the World.

(The third Advent candle is lit)

C: God of Promise, come into our darkness. Renew your hope in us, for you alone bring life out of death.

P: Receive God's promise of light from Isaiah 57:

"For you shall go out in joy, and be led back in peace; the mountains and the hills before you shall burst into song, and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands. Instead of the thorn shall come up the cypress; instead of the brier shall come up the myrtle; and it shall be to the Lord for a memorial, for an everlasting sign that shall not be cut off."

C: Let the light of your face shine upon us, O LORD. We will rise up and go forth in joy. For you alone, O LORD, make us dwell in safety. May your unfailing love rest upon us, O LORD, even as we put our hope in you.

Announcements

Introduction

"Rejoice always," begins the reading from 1 Thessalonians. Isaiah and the psalmist make clear that God is turning our mourning into laughter and shouts of joy. "All God's children got a robe," go the words of a spiritual. It is not so much a stately, formal, pressed outfit as it is a set of party clothes, clothes we are happy to wear. We receive that robe in baptism, and in worship we gather for a foretaste of God's party.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 61:1-2, 8-11

Though the people had returned to Jerusalem from exile in Babylon, they continued to face hardship and oppression. In the language of the jubilee year described in Leviticus 25, the prophet, moved by the spirit of God, announces deliverance for those who are oppressed and comfort for those who mourn.

¹The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me:

he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed,

to bind up the brokenhearted,

to proclaim liberty to the captives,

and release to the prisoners;

²to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor,

and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn;

⁸For I the Lord love justice,

I hate robbery and wrongdoing;

I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them.

⁹Their descendants shall be known among the nations, and their offspring among the peoples;

all who see them shall acknowledge

that they are a people whom the Lord has blessed.

¹⁰I will greatly rejoice in the Lord,

my whole being shall exult in my God;

for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness,

as a bride groom decks himself with a garland,

and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels.

¹¹For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise

to spring up before all the nations.

PSALM: 126 — Congregation responds in **BOLD**.

¹When the Lord restored the fortunes of Zion, then were we like those who dream.

²Then was our mouth filled with laughter, and our tongue with shouts of joy.

Then they said among the nations, "The Lord has done great things for them."

³The Lord has done great things for us, and we are glad indeed.

⁴Restore our fortunes, O Lord,

like the watercourses of the Negeb.

⁵Those who sowed with tears will reap with songs of joy.

⁶Those who go out weeping, carrying the seed, will come again with joy, shouldering their sheaves.

SECOND READING: 1 Thessalonians 5:16-24

Paul concludes his letter to the Thessalonians by encouraging them to live lives of continual joy, prayer, and thanksgiving. The closing blessing is grounded in the hope of Christ's coming.

¹⁶Rejoice always, ¹⁷pray without ceasing, ¹⁸give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. ¹⁹Do not quench the Spirit. ²⁰Do not despise the words of prophets, ²¹but test everything; hold fast to what is good; ²²abstain from every form of evil.

²³May the God of peace himself sanctify you entirely; and may your spirit and soul and body be kept sound and blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. ²⁴The one who calls you is faithful, and he will do this.

P: The Gospel according to John Chapter 1.

GOSPEL: John 1:6-8, 19-28

John's gospel describes Jesus as the "light of the world." John the Baptist is presented as a witness to Jesus, one who directs attention away from himself to Christ, the true light.

⁶There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light.

¹⁹This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" ²⁰He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, "I am not the Messiah." ²¹And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No." ²²Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" ²³He said.

"I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness,

'Make straight the way of the Lord,"

as the prophet Isaiah said.

²⁴Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. ²⁵They asked him, "Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?" ²⁶John answered them, "I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, ²⁷the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal." ²⁸This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

Jesus, the Light

Jesus bids us shine . . . You in your small corner, and I in mine. -Susan B. Warner (1819-1885)

A common theme of the Advent season is that of growing light in the encroaching darkness of these days. People are instinctively drawn to this symbol of warmth and love. This season provides an opportunity to emphasize again the true light, which came into our world in the person of Jesus Christ. It is our joy to shine this light brightly into whatever corner or situation we find ourselves. The words of a Sunday school song of an earlier generation remind us we can do this: "you in your small corner, and I in mine."

The truth of that everlasting light is that it still shines and will never be extinguished. Lesser luminaries have come and gone. Despite the lack of peace and understanding between nations and people and all the complexities around us, the light, which came down to earth, is the life and staying power of God. John the Baptist came to testify to the light that was already needed in a world of darkness and fear. He boldly confessed faith in this light which was not his own, but which illuminated the Christ.

We carry Christ's light out with us from this service, back into an often indifferent world. And we, like John the Baptist, are not afraid, timid, or ashamed of Jesus Christ, the Holy One. The Light of the world. Together we will make a difference by the grace of God. We take this light into the world, "you in your small corner, and I in mine."
