Lighting the Advent Wreath—The First Candle

P: The green wreath is a sign of new life, even in the dark of winter. The circle shape of the wreath reminds us that God's love is never-ending.

C: He comes to be with us forever!

- P: "I am the Alpha and the Omega . . . the beginning and the end." God's love never ends. It will always be there, like a circle surrounding us everywhere!
- C: The shape of our Advent wreath helps us to know that God is eternal. His Word tells us so.
- P: The first candle is called "The Prophet's Candle." Prophets like Isaiah shared God's message. God told the people to get ready for the promised Savior.
- C: A light to shine in the darkened world. "Prepare," the prophets said, "the light of God is coming."
- P: The prophets foretold the Savior would come. God's light would soon shine out to guide everyone. We light the first candle and pray this prayer:
- C: "Dear Jesus, you're coming. Please help us prepare."

(Light the first candle)

Announcements

Introduction

Stir up your power, and come! The psalmist's plea in Psalm 80:2 has become familiar to us in the Advent prayers. Isaiah wants God to rip the heavens open. Both cry out for an apparently distant, angry God to show up, to save, to restore. When we hear Jesus describing the coming of the Son of Man with stars falling from heaven, it can sound dire and horrible, not like anything we would ever hope for. But when we really look at the suffering of people God loves, we can share the hope that God would tear open the heavens and come.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 64:1-9

This lament comes from a people who have had their hopes shattered. The visions of a rebuilt Jerusalem and a renewed people of God, spoken of in Isaiah 40–55, have not been realized. Instead, the people experience ruin, conflict, and famine. This lament calls God to account—to be the God who has brought deliverance in the past.

¹O that you would tear open the heavens and come down,

so that the mountains would quake at your presence-

²as when fire kindles brushwood

and the fire causes water to boil-

to make your name known to your adversaries,

so that the nations might tremble at your presence!

³When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect,

you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. ⁴From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eve has seen any God besides vou. who works for those who wait for him. ⁵You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned: because you hid yourself we transgressed. ⁶We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth. We all fade like a leaf. and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away. ⁷There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you; for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity. ⁸Yet, O LORD, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand. ⁹Do not be exceedingly angry, O LORD, and do not remember iniquity forever. Now consider, we are all your people.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 1:3-9

As the Christians in Corinth await the advent of Jesus, Paul reminds them how the Lord has already enriched them through spiritual gifts and will continue to strengthen them until the coming day of the Lord.

³Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

⁴I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, ⁵for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind—⁶just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you—⁷so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁸He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁹God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.



Megan Amos has been the principal horn player of the Toledo Symphony since 2019. Additionally, Megan is joining the Columbus Symphony for a temporary appointment as acting principal horn for part of the 2023-2024 season. In 2019, Megan was the grand prize winner of the Susan Slaughter Solo Brass Competition at the 2019 International Women's Brass Conference. In addition to

the Toledo Symphony, Megan has appeared as a soloist with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic, Perrysburg Symphony, and the Aspen Music Festival. In 2017, Megan did a solo tour in Moscow and St Petersburg, Russia as part of the Educational Bridge Project. Megan frequently performs with orchestras in the area including the Fort Wayne Philharmonic where she was the principal horn player from 2018-2019, the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, and the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. Originally from York, Maine, Megan studied at the New England Conservatory from 2013-2017.

Megan's mentors include Jamie Sommerville and Adam Unsworth. Megan performs on the third horn made by the legendary Ukrainian-American horn maker, Jerry Lechniuk.

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Stay Awake!

Some envision the end of the world as annihilation in thermonuclear destruction or in a human race that chokes to death on its own fumes of progress. Some imagine a collision of the planets. Others view this event as the freezing of the world because the sun has burned out, or as the overheating of the world because solar energy has moved in too close. Still others look for a specific day or hour when the earth and its inhabitants will be no more.

For us and countless other believers, however, the words of today's gospel sound a clarion call. We are invited to watch for the signs of the times. As these signs begin to take place, we are looking for the blessed advent of our Lord and great redeemer, Jesus Christ.

However, the curtain has not yet been lifted on the last act of our human drama. It may be five minutes to midnight and the zero hour. But that hour has not yet struck. The symphony is still unfinished; the last movement is yet to be played.

Those last signs will come in one form or another, in one way or another. The events, once started, will not go away nor be dismissed. The end-time events described in the gospels will in their own way unfold upon the stage of human history. And there will be no turning back the clock to another day, week, or time.

By God's grace and mercy, we shall stand in that multitude without number before the throne and before the very face of God for the first time! When all else has passed away, we will welcome the advent of our Lord Jesus Christ who has indeed delayed his coming, but who now finally comes to receive us.

So that we do not miss anything, wait patiently and keep awake!
